Wednesday, November 11 (Remembrance Day) We pray for all who suffer or have died as a result of conflict or war. We ask for God's blessing on peacemakers and peacekeepers in this country and around the world, and that God protect and guide those who serve in the armed forces.

Thursday, November 12 We pray for women accused of witchcraft in Ghana who have found safety and freedom from stigma at the Presbyterian World Service & Development-supported Gambaga Outcast Home.

Friday, November 13 We pray for Lisa Baker who serves as the convener of the In-reach Committee for the Presbytery of Winnipeg.

Saturday, November 14 We pray for all students enrolled in the church's theological colleges as they seek to learn and grow in their faith.

Our Evolving Church Services -

Christmas is approaching and with that comes the Christmas hampers. Community Food Sharing has gotten in touch about this year's hampers. We are looking at what we can safely do to create and deliver or have people pick-up hampers. If you have some thoughts on how we can do this, or if you would be interested in helping us, please get in touch with any member of the Session or Board.

Meanwhile, people have been asking whether we still provide **“Wheels to Worship”**? And the answer is **“Yes!”**. If you need a ride to church, please call Newfound Cabs.

New ** Church Service's Self Assessment Guide and Sign-in / Sign out Sheet Process

St. David's has improved the process for completing our Self Assessment Guide (SAG) and the sign-in procedure for Sunday's church service. The manager on duty will ask you the questions on our SAG and will complete it for you. They will also complete the sign-in sheet allowing you to proceed directly into the sanctuary if all is well. As has been happening for some time, the manager will also complete the sign-out sheets allowing you to leave in an orderly manner.

The sign-in and sign-out form is to allow contact tracing, should we ever need to do so. If you are a member of the congregation, we only need your name and phone number. If you are not a member, you will also be asked for your address.

Coming to Visit St. David's not during a service – A Review

You will be required to complete two forms, the SAG and the sign-in sheet. The SAG is valid for 24 hours and there are many ways to complete it (you can call in your answers to the church office, to any member of the Board or

Session, or you can fill in the form and email it to the church). It helps to determine if you should visit St. David`s or stay home. The second form is a sign in and out form. This is to allow contact tracing, should we ever need to do so. If you are a member of the congregation, please enter your name and phone number. If you are not a member, you will also be asked for your address. When you leave, you must also sign-out.

Sunday Service November 8th

This coming Sunday we will follow the new process for the completion of the SAG and the sign-in sheets. We will again have people enter through the breezeway and come in through the side narthex door or the front door. The person or the “bubble” will be seated. The exit plan is to leave via the door to the lobby and out through the tower door. There will be managers and elders to greet you and if you are new to the process, they will help you through it.

Public Health Guidelines

This statement comes directly from the Public Health guidelines: “While not a requirement, Public Health maintains their warning to people 60 and above, or with additional risk factors, to avoid any non-essential gathering.” We feel duty bound to openly communicate this statement. We will certainly welcome and include anyone wishing to join us in person for worship. Meanwhile, we will continue to offer on-line services for those who may prefer that option. Everyone should feel comfortable participating in or engaging in any activity in which they take part. Do not feel compelled to participate, nor be barred from participating, by virtue of age or underlying medical condition. Every precaution to meet and exceed the Public Health guidelines will be taken. However, that is not a guarantee that we can make our gathering a risk-free activity. We all look forward to a day when this Public Service warning is no longer required. We would like to thank you for your co-operation in helping us ensure we are all protected.

Treasurer's Report

The email address we are using to accept donations is stdavidsnfld@gmail.com and this one is linked to our bank account and it will **automatically accept** all donations.

If you send (e-transfer) money to the church at its "normal" email address which is stdavids@nfld.com. The money will sit in a kind of "cyber lost space" for 30 days (your bank may use a shorter timespan), then your money automatically returns to your account. Alternately, if you've e-transferred money and no one has yet accepted it, you may cancel the transaction yourself within 24 hours. The money again returns to your account, however, you may be charged a fee for this service, depending on your bank the fee ranges from \$3 to \$4.

What are People Doing?

The other day I was visiting Elizabeth Thistle and we got talking about an old photograph on her table. It turns out this was a picture of Elizabeth's family back in the summer of 1946. We enjoyed a wonderful conversation about everyone in the picture and I learned quite a bit about Elizabeth's family.

Elizabeth was a Kelly. Her father, Tom Kelly, was from Bull Cove, part of today's Brigus. Her mother was Marcella Moores from Northern Bay. One fascinating story about Elizabeth's family was that two sisters married two brothers – Marcella's sister, Bertha, married Tom's brother, Ern! The Kelly family eventually moved to St. John's and lived on Gear Street (between Prince of Wales Street and Franklin Avenue). They had 5 children, Madge,

George, Harold, Ern and Elizabeth. Tom Kelly was a binder at Dick's & Company for 50 years. He had an excellent reputation among his customers for doing quality work. When Tom retired, he and Marcella made the decision to move to Montreal to be closer to Madge and her family, who had moved there some years before.

Elizabeth's siblings always stayed in close contact with one another even though some were separated by distance. Madge married Albert MacGillivray. They had 1 daughter, Judith. Elizabeth was telling me that she and Judith still call one another weekly and enjoy a fine chat. Harold met a local girl, Jean, and settled down in St. John's. Elizabeth's other two brothers, Ern and George, were in the army during WWII. While overseas, they each found the love of their life – for Ern it was Mary and for George, it was Eve. Both Ern and George returned to Newfoundland with their “war brides”. As was common back in those days, young couples often lived with their parents until they got “settled”. Let's just say that the Kelly house was well-lived in!

Elizabeth also told me the story of how she and Dave met. It all started with a date to go to a movie – a very big-deal back then! That first date led to others, including trips to “Mrs. Chafe's” on Topsail Road for hamburgers, hot-dogs and later on french fries (a real treat!!). The result of that first date and the courtship that followed was a long and treasured married life together.

Dave's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thistle, lived on Scott Street. Mr. Thistle had his own electrical company on Prescott Street and while Mrs. Thistle had trained to be a nurse, once married she stayed at home with the children. Dave had two other brothers – Jim, who worked for CBC and Eric, who was an electrician with Memorial University. Dave meanwhile, worked for ADT for many years and was well respected by his customers and co-workers alike. He was remembered for being meticulous with any job he undertook and for being a mentor and advisor for any new employee that joined the company.

By the time Elizabeth and Dave married, Mr. Thistle had passed away. The young couple moved into the house on Scott Street to look after Mrs. Thistle and Elizabeth says she has special memories of Rev. Armour dropping by for many a visit with Mrs. Thistle. Elizabeth and David had two children, Margo (Noseworthy) currently living in Corner Brook with her family and Gail (Whitten, d. 2010). Scott Street remained their home for many years and still holds many wonderful, happy memories for Margo and Elizabeth. Today, Elizabeth lives in Masonic Park, (Dave d. 2017). Many of us know that Elizabeth loves music and that she was very active in the Church Choir for many years. Today, she is an faithful member of our WA group and is a great supporter of all our Church activities. Elizabeth is looking forward to travelling to Corner Brook later on in November to spend time with her family over Christmas and into the New Year.
