## Bridges to Hope



For the sake of clarity and consistency, Bridges To Hope recently updated the contents of its food hampers to Small, Medium and Large sizes. This was done to eliminate confusion, especially when hampers are needed for larger families.

For your information, below are the contents for a **SMALL** hamper, which is meant to provide 2-3 days food for 1-2 people. The Medium and Large hampers contain basically the same items, but in larger quantities. School kits and other extra items are added as required and when available. Personal care items - shampoo, toothpaste, deodorant, etc. are very much in demand as well.

Using this as a guide, next time you're grocery shopping, why not add one or two non-perishable items to place on the food trolley at St. David's. If you're not back to Church on a regular basis yet, food can always be dropped off at the Church Office. As always too, cash or gift cards are helpful and greatly appreciated.

## **News from the Pews**

### **The Garland Family**

A few weeks ago, I sat down and had a lovely chat with Andy (Andrew) Garland. Many of you may remember that Andy's wife, Roma, passed away last October (2020). Even though Andy and Roma were not always able to make it to Church because of work commitments, they supported many of the teas, sales and other events here at St. David's. Whenever I paid them a visit, we always enjoyed a wonderful chat and they made me feel very much at home. I wanted to learn more about their early lives - their families, how they met, what their interests were, etc. - and now I can share that with you so that you can get to know this lovely family.

Roma was born in 1954 in the town of Mount Pearl to Ruby and William Spurrell. She had 4 brothers – Donald (died when he was a baby), Bill (d. 2010), Herb and Larry. Roma's dad passed away when she was only 5 or 6 years old and her mother was left to raise the children on her own. The family might not have had a lot of material things, but they were loved and had a happy home. Roma went to school in Mount Pearl and later attended Bishop's. She started working at an early age – at the Giant Mart in Mount Pearl, Woolco at the Village Mall, and then Wal-Mart, Mount Pearl.

Andy's family likewise had an interesting history. His father, Lenard married Gertrude, and they had two children, Marion and Gordon. Gertrude passed away and Lenard eventually married Jessie Mathieson. They had two children – Ada and Andy. Andy went to school at Holloway and then to Prince of Wales. He was joking that most of his teachers including Miss Dingle, Miss Leslie and Mr. McCurdy all retired the year after he was in their class! As it happens, I also went to Holloway School, although a few years after Andy had been there, but we both remembered Rev McKim and how he would conduct assembly every Friday morning. Andy was saying that Rev McKim was the Minister of George Street United Church and later was in charge of the United Church Residence which was right next to Holloway School.

After Andy finished school, he worked at a number of places including Ayre's Dominion and Prudential Insurance of America selling life insurance. In later years, Andy also worked at Wal-Mart making it a family affair – Roma worked there, as mentioned earlier, as well as Heather, Roma's daughter. (Heather still works at Wal-Mart and sometimes, if our paths cross while I'm shopping there, I get to have a little chat with her if she is not too busy!)

It turns out that Andy's grandparents had some land between present day Cornwall Avenue and (Old) Topsail Road. As a matter of fact. Andy's grandparents lived in a house on that property that belonged to the Anglo-Development Company. According to Andy, he remembers a long winding driveway with hawthorn bushes on either side, going from the front door of

the house down towards Topsail Road! As with most families, the land eventually got divided into different lots for family members. Today, Andy lives on what was the middle lot facing Cornwall Avenue – and his grandparents' original house is just east of his. Needless to say, Andy knows all his neighbours!

But how did Roma and Andy meet? Well, it turns out that both Roma's dad and Andy's dad went to St. Andrew's (The Kirk). They knew each other from there but it was another coincidence that brought them together. Andy was in the Jaycees, as were Roma's two brothers. (The Jaycees was the Junior Chamber of Commerce – a leadership training organization that encouraged management skills and community service.) Apparently, there was a dance coming up and Andy was looking for a date to take to the dance. He happened to run into Roma and her mother at the Supermarket, and because they knew one another through Church and through her brothers, she accepted the invitation. This was the beginning of many happy years for both of them.

Roma and Andy shared many interests but the one that stood out was their work with the Shriners. Andy, like his father and brothers, was a Mason. He later went on to become a Shriner. Roma was an active member of the Ladies of the Sabre. Together they worked on the many projects and activities sponsored by the Shriners and were great supporters of the Shriners' Hospitals for Children. These hospitals provide specialized care for children with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries and cleft palate, regardless of their families' ability to pay. Andy continues to be a part of this great organization and has made many lasting friendships as a result.

## Gardening with Gerhard

This week, with so much discouraging news, my thoughts went to brighter times ahead and getting back into the garden. One of the things I have often wondered about is this theory about “companion planting” – that some vegetables do better when they are planted next to certain vegetables than others. I asked Gerhard about this and here is his response:

*Companion planting is a newfangled way of gardening. I know about and have read articles about it. But I don't have much experience with it and therefore cannot speak with authority about it.*

*A long time ago when my vegetable patch was smaller, there was never enough space to grow all the varieties we liked and also try new ones. So I had to do much interplanting, which is growing different veggies in the same bed. I remember that the carrots coming up between lettuce and strawberry plants often tended to be noticeably bigger than average.*

*I am afraid this is all the wisdom I have for you this time, Janet.*
