Message From the Minister



This week, we had a national election. Michelle and I took the kids along (Oliver is showing his "V" for "voting" fingers in the picture outside our polling station), and cast our votes with the wonderful smug feeling of participating in something important: democracy! It was exciting for the kids to go somewhere new and try to understand what everyone there was doing; I tried to explain to Oliver that we were all saying who we thought should lead Canada, and he said he wanted to do it.

Unfortunately, the results of the election were much less exciting than the process of voting. Only a few seats even changed hands, and I don't think anyone involved felt like they accomplished something worth celebrating. Things are very rapidly just back to more of the same.

As Christians, we are called to persevere. As we try to follow Jesus Christ and do the right thing, we will face setbacks from time to time. Sometimes that will be hardship: something bad will happen to us or one we love and we will find ourselves in a time of crisis. But much more often, instead of

hardship, we find we have to persevere through the doldrums. Much of the time, we don't struggle with anything so obvious as evil or death, but rather boredom and ennui. Not every battle is grand, and not every Godly choice feels like a victory.

But as I look back on the time we spent getting everyone organized to go vote in what turned out to be a pointless election, I realize there was still value in it. My sons learned to value voting a little bit more, and Oliver had some of his earliest political thoughts of ruling the country. I fed a good habit, voting, and we are all a little more ready for the next vote, which is, I suppose, just a week or so away for us here in St. John's!

This week, may you persevere in Christian living. Not every good deed will feel like it accomplishes much, but sometimes seeds are planted when you least expect it, and will produce fruit only much later.

Note From Gerhard Bassler

Keeping with the garden theme, many of you know Gerhard has a beautiful "garden" around-the-bay and this time of year it's always good to hear from him and get an update on how things are going with his vegetables. Here's his note sent a few days after Hurricane Larry passed through. Thanks Gerhard!

Good to hear from you. I spent the last two days in my outport garden cleaning up after the hurricane and trying to keep on top of the abundant harvest we are having this year. The storm uprooted a 45 year old golden chain tree in front of our house and broke a lot of big tree branches off all over the place. Luckily none of them fell on my vegetable garden and we were also spared from flooding with salt water as happened to some unfortunate people in neighbouring communities like Admirals Beach whose house was close to the sea level

In the garden the top sections of some of my pole beans were shredded by the force of the winds and my two beautiful apple trees, that had more apples on them than I have ever seen before, had three quarters of them knocked to the ground. I filled three of Costco's large banana boxes with them and took them to Christine who is processing them. Apart from the bounty of apples I am harvesting bumper crops of beans, snow peas, zucchini, blackberries, and tomatoes right now. Beans, zucchini, and blackberries will keep ripening as long as temperatures stay up and we have no frost. This year I started two long rows of leek, and for lack of suitable space, planted radicchio, some leaf lettuce, and a few beets between them. The result has been incredible: I have never been able to grow such beautiful radicchio before; none of it was attacked by slugs that are plentiful in my garden and the few beets grew larger than usual. The leek appears to

have promoted the growth of lettuce and beets, and also deterred the slugs. The leek grew to a larger than normal size despite being hemmed by lettuce on each side. Next year I am planning to resume this kind of "interplanting" on a larger scale.

My 25 tomato plants are all in the greenhouse, except for two. They are all doing extremely well and seem to be ripening all the tomatoes I am allowing them to grow on the vine before it gets too cold. This year I also planted four discard seedlings of the "Big Beef" variety for the first time to see what I would get. They produced as many tomatoes as my favourite Early Girl and Early Cascade varieties, some of them the size of a baby head. Raspberries, black currants, jostas, beans, and blackberries I put in the deep freeze right away. Last night I was up till past 2 am blanching beans and freezing blackberries. The garden is literally taking all my time and will continue to do so as long as the warm weather lasts. Then follows the cleanup—dismantling the bean trellises and digging/rototilling the ground to inhibit weed growth next year. There go my weekends until at least the end of October!
