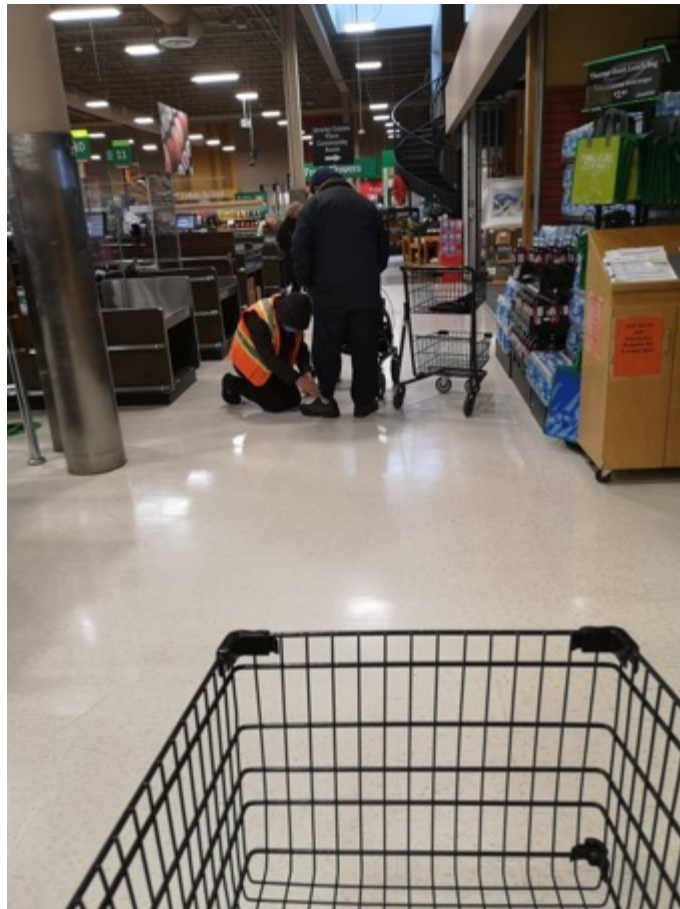
Wednesday, December 1 (World AIDS Day) We pray for all people affected by HIV and AIDS.

Message from the Minister



"We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time. Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption to sonship, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently." (Romans 8:22-25)

This Sunday, we are entering into the church season of Advent. Advent is a time of waiting, anticipating the arrival of Christ. This is the Sunday of Hope, the first of four Sundays leading up to Christmas. We are preparing for Jesus Christ to arrive in that Bethlehem manger, getting ready for the story of the God-baby coming to surprise us in weakness, waiting for Christ to come.

But as we remember the manger, we also remember that we are waiting for Christ to come again, to dry every tear and restore our world and bring to completion all of God's plans that we work for: healing, compassion, joy and peace.

Hope means thinking the future is worth waiting for. Hope restores our faith in the future, telling us that something good is ahead. That kind of attitude can be hard these days, but every now and then something will come along that will restore a little hope in you. For me this week, it happened in the grocery store: as I was pushing my cart back out the door, I saw an elderly gentleman whose shoe had come untied walking back to his car. An employee noticed his shoe, stopped him, and knelt down to tie it for him. I thought of Jesus washing his disciples' feet, and how tying shoes might be a modern version of that sign of subservience, but most of all I thought of how glad I was of the reminder that people still want to help each other. It can be easy to get discouraged, to feel like we are driven apart by the pandemic and our communities will not recover, but today I have Hope. In all of this, we are not defeated. After all of this, Love will triumph again. That is Good News.

Out-and- About with Gerhard Bassler – Winterizing the Garden

Years ago, Brian and I would go crazy the latter part of November into December, “winterizing” the garden – tying up little bushes, covering other shrubs with burlap – until we noticed one winter that some of the bushes we never got to, survived the ravages of a Newfoundland winter just fine even though they were flattened to the ground with snow and sleet. Then I happened to hear an esteemed gardener say that “...any tree or bush that couldn’t survive one of our winters, didn’t deserve to be in our garden....” OK, a little harsh maybe especially when a bush or tree has great sentimental value for you or your family and you want to protect it from the ice and sleet storms. So I thought I would ask Gerhard Bassler what he does to winterize his garden. Never hurts to have a second opinion so here’s what Gerhard had to say....

Experience has taught me that much of the winterizing I used to do is unnecessary. In Newfoundland with its maritime climate every winter, just like every summer, is different. Unlike in mainland areas with a continental climate, the ground here rarely freezes so hard for a long time that it kills the few garden plants you want to keep alive. In our climate, covering up plants too much for several months can be just as damaging as no cover. Most perennial plants and shrubs can tolerate a fair amount of freezing temperatures as long as they are not exposed to icy winds. Plastic and

cotton covers and wraps, in particular, tend to suffocate plants, especially when the sun shines on them, and enable pests and diseases to spread.

Evergreen bows from spruce, fir or pine trees have always offered a most effective winter protection for perennial garden plants, such strawberries and rhubarb. They facilitate air circulation and even enable some plants to keep growing in winter. Apart from some perennial flowers, I cover strawberry plants with bows to prevent them from being heaved up and their roots exposed when the ground freezes and thaws repeatedly. Rhubarb plants, if covered through the winter, and especially in the cold early spring months, have always rewarded me with an extra early crop of juicy stalks. And parsley can be harvested under bows through most winters. Blackberries canes carry more fruit if their soft wood is protected from severe frost and buried in a leaf or compost mulch up to one foot above the ground, or covered with bows.

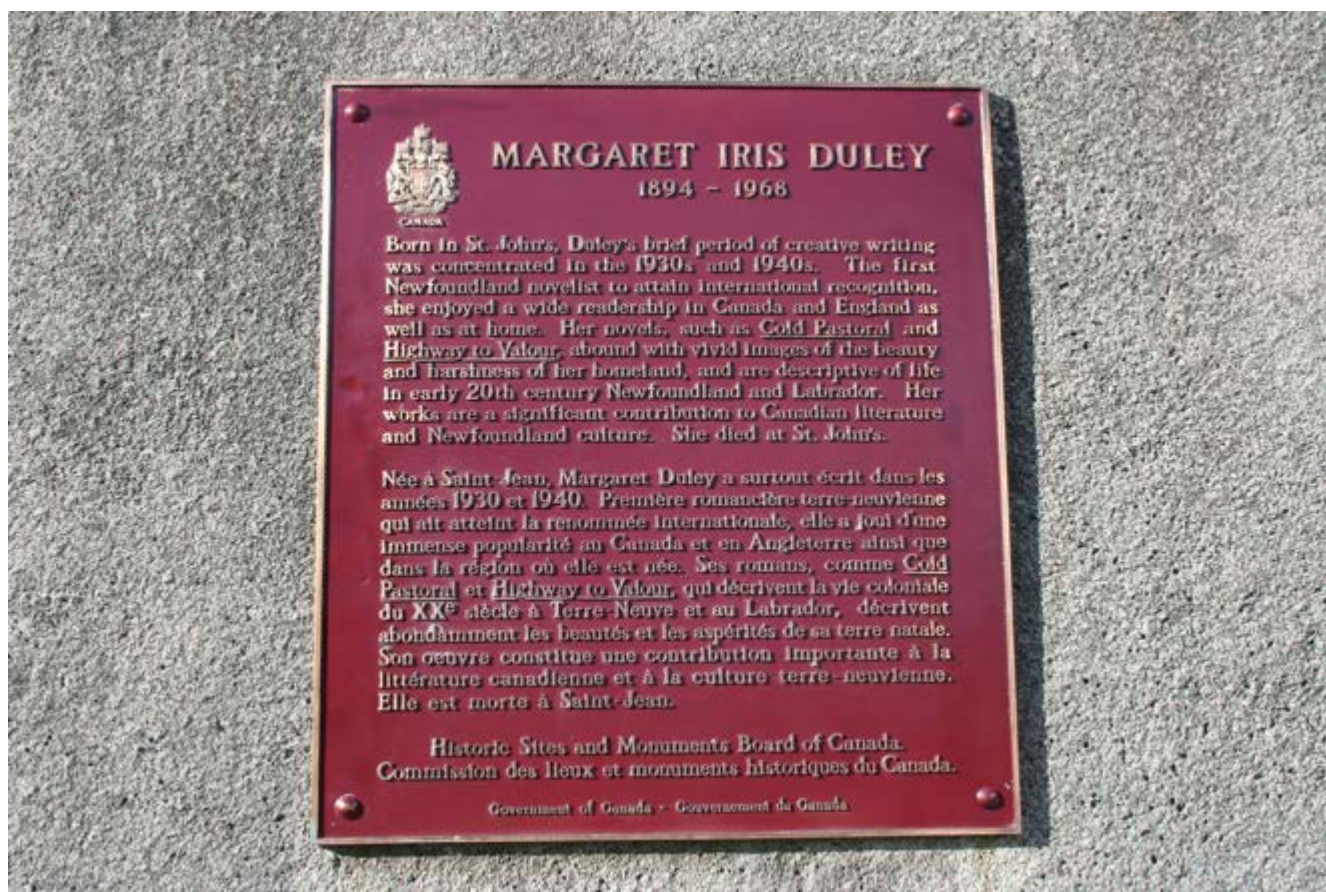
My most unpleasant chore before the onset of winter is to dig up and/or rototill the cultivated parts of vegetable garden, including the walkways, in order to cut down on weed growth the following year. It allows the frost to penetrate and destroy the root structures of the weeds and kill their sprouting seeds. I found that it really works, otherwise I wouldn't do it.

Margaret Duley Plaque – Follow-up

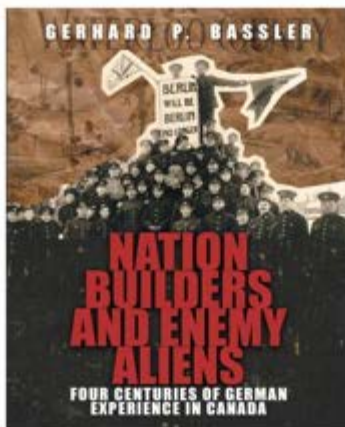
