This week Michelle and I went out for a special lunch together. No, it wasn't a birthday, and it wasn't an anniversary. We went out to celebrate Orson's first day of day care this week. Oliver was at day care too, so it just the two of us, and although we'll have one kid-free day a week from now on, this lunch marked one of only a handful of times we've both been out during the day without the kids.

To be honest, it is badly needed. Lockdown with two preschoolers is draining, and a desire for isolation, expense of babysitters, and the lack of places to go have all contributed to us spending most evenings at home. It's the easiest option.

But boy am I glad that daycare space finally opened up for Orson once a week. Sitting with Michelle, eating a hot meal in peace, I realized how easy it is for us to become complacent. In the scriptures, people flock to Jesus for healing. They rush to him, pressing towards him, begging for help, and he notices them and heals them. Those who suffer call out to him, loudly, and they won't let anyone quiet them.

This pandemic has brought a measure of suffering to us all. It's good to be honest about that. God's strength is revealed through our weakness, and God has compassion on those who call out. As pandemic restrictions are starting to loosen, we will find we have work to do for those around us, healing the suffering that still lingers on. From the Board, Session and Treasurer

In-person Church Services February 27th

This will be our third in-person service since the restrictions were changed. We will also stream the service live and place it on YouTube for later viewing. We follow the guidance of Public Health and our own Covid-19 Best Practices Committee (CBPC), as follows:

Services continue in a hybrid (in-person and virtual) format. You do not need to complete an assessment form. If we have checked your VaxPass previously, we do not need to do so again. If you have not had your VaxPass verified, we do need to verify it. Mandatory indoor masking is required at all times for everyone over the age of five, children four years and under are exempt from masking. Please adhere to Public Health guidelines on staying home if you feel sick, are symptomatic, or if you have had an exposure to COVID. Please maintain physical distancing when in church.

Getting the Service and Bulletin using our website

This bulletin is placed on our website as soon as the Rollmann family receives a copy on Friday morning. The website is stdavids.nf.ca and if you type this in as your search, our website will be right there. At the top of the main page is a "Sunday Service" which will take you to this week's service link and bulletin. Since our Sunday services are now live-streamed, the link is already posted so people can experience the Sunday service at home live beginning at 11 am on Sunday. If you click on Video Service for Feb 27th you will see the screen and the note: live in "a number" of hours. After the fact, you can see the YouTube video of the service. If you would like to catch up on previous services all are available, simply scroll through the services and choose the Sunday service or bulletin that you would like to see or read.

The sympathy and prayers of the congregation go to Kay Scott and the Cumby family on the passing of Eric Cumby. Eric passed away on Saturday, February 19, 2022.

Many of us here at St. David's did not know Eric until a couple of years ago but in that short time, he left a lasting impression on everyone who was fortunate enough to get to know him. He loved the "St. David's crowd" – how we accepted newcomers, how we worked together to help others, how we enjoyed sharing meals together, how we volunteered our time to do what had to be done. But more importantly, he made Kay's life very special and we loved him for that.

Brian and I have very special memories of Eric – little things he said or did – and we will treasure them for a long time to come. We know many of you share those same thoughts as well. We cherish the memories and celebrate his life.

It is with very heavy hearts that we announce the passing of our beloved father, grandfather, great-grandfather, partner, and friend on February 19.

Eric Watson Cumby was larger than life itself. An enormous personality, Eric's wisdom, keen wit, and sharp intellect were gifts given freely to all he encountered. He could debate any subject with deep knowledge and great passion based on a lifetime of studying those around him and a love of books, culture, and history. He was greatly loved and generously returned that love to his family and a broad circle of friends spanning decades and countries.

He loved to travel and learn every single day and did so with intention his entire life.

Eric was born in 1936 and lived his first 10 years in Millertown. He always held special feelings and memories of those years and about life along Red Indian Lake. He and his family then moved to Grand Falls, which he described as a cultural shock, but he grew to adjust and thrive. He made many friends during his childhood, some of whom became lifelong. He developed a lasting interest in sports and played baseball and hockey for many years. He became a Boston Bruins fan when he received his first jersey at age 11.

After graduating high school, Eric attended Acadia University. He returned to Newfoundland to work and that is when he began dating Isabel Byrd. They married on September 7, 1960 and headed off to New York City for their honeymoon. Soon thereafter, they moved to Angola, Indiana so Eric could pursue his electrical engineering degree. While in Angola, their first child – Judy was born. They then moved to Springfield, Illinois, where both Barbie and Mike were born. In time, the pull of home and family became too strong to resist and they returned to Newfoundland, living in St. John's and Gander and then settling back in Grand Falls where both Jill and Brenda were born. During the years of raising a family and working at Newfoundland Power, Eric continued to value community involvement and served with minor hockey, Boy Scouts, various boards of directors and was a longtime active member of the Kiwanis service club, having served as president for a term.

In 1987, Eric and Isabel relocated to St. John's where he worked as a vice-president with Newfoundland Power, both in customer service and later in human resources. He retired in 1992 and after a year, he decided to return to the workforce. This time, Eric and Isabel moved to Inuvik in the NWT for about three years, serving as manager of Western Operations with Northwest Territories Power. Eric and Isabel loved their time in Canada's

North. Finally, they returned to St. John's and settled fully into retirement, during which Eric spent time walking, swimming, and practising yoga.

Eric was a man who earned the respect of all who knew him. He had a great understanding of humanity, believed in treating everyone with respect, and was very compassionate towards those in need. He continued to live out these principles until the end of his life through his involvement with the St. Vincent de Paul Society through Mary Queen of the World Parish. He provided counsel and wisdom to many over the years who reached out for his assistance.

He loved literature, poetry and was very philosophical. Some of his favourites included Robert Frost's – "The Road Not Taken": "Two Roads Diverged in a wood, and I – I took the one less travelled by. And that has made all the difference." He also shared from his Buddha readings: "In the end, all that mattered is how much we loved, how gently we lived, how gracefully we let go of those things that weren't meant to be." He added "how tightly we held to those things that mattered. Be good to each other."

Left with cherished memories are his partner Kathleen Scott, children Judy of St. John's, Barbara (Ian) MacLean of Fall River, NS; Mike (Lisa Hickey) of Greenville, SC; Jill of Halifax, NS; and Brenda (Steve) Wall of Kensington, Connecticut; grandchildren Danielle (Prashanth Ramanathan), Alyssa, Kevin, Karina, and Amelia MacLean; Sam, Luke, and Emma Cumby; Zack and Amy Wall; great grandchildren Kaila, Harris, and Alora Ramanathan; as well as many nieces, nephews, and friends.

Eric was predeceased by his wife Isabel, parents Mabel and Ellis Cumby, brothers Hayward, Eldon, Kevin, sister Mona, and grandson and namesake Eric MacLean.

The answer is: In March 1829, Rev. Ward attended a dinner put off by the Mechanics Institute and held at the Globe Tavern. There was a good time with much hilarity and singing of national and sentimental songs until 4 am the next day. He proposed the toast "Civil and religious liberty all over the world".

This week the question is: In 1829, a bill passed in the British Parliament called the Roman Catholic Relief Bill. It took a while for this to make a difference in Newfoundland. What was again legal to do in the Chapel in 1833?

Recent History:

Last week the question was: Back in the day, a city-wide World Day of Prayer service was held. In 1974, it was held at St. David's. Who from St. David's were the speaker, the soloist, and the president who led the worship?
