Mission Moment – Sunday, May 29

In Ghana, 25-year-old Dominic Anane was born with a congenital hearing disability. Like many in Ghana who have disabilities, Dominic was discriminated against. His family and community denied him formal education as a result of negative cultural attitudes associated with his disability. One day, Dominic was identified during a survey by a community-based rehabilitation staff member and enrolled in a program where he was provided with a sewing machine and vocational training in tailoring and dressmaking. **Today, Dominic has established his own business and makes dresses for customers in his community.** Dominic expressed his gratitude: “I feel privileged to have benefitted from the community-based rehabilitation program, which has truly made my life meaningful.” This livelihood program is supported by the church through Presbyterian World Service & Development.

Message from the Minister:



This week, I want to address a more serious topic in the Minister's Message. My position gives me a platform to speak, and so when a contemporary issue comes up that I think has connections to our faith, I sometimes feel it is both a privilege and a responsibility to share.

In the United States, there has been a draft statement leaked from the Supreme Court that shows it is very likely that the landmark legal decision of "Roe v. Wade" may soon be overturned. This would pass the responsibility for determining whether abortions should be legal or not down to the individual states; abortions might be legal in California, but illegal in Texas, that sort of thing. In preparation, states are deciding what their laws would be, with many realizing they need to create legal protection against extradition for doctors who perform abortions for out-of-state 'visitors' to their clinics.

I feel very strongly that this potential change to abortion law is wrong. One message that comes across consistently in scripture is God's care for the poor and oppressed, and God's fury against those who mistreat them from a position of power. Even in the Old Testament, the minor prophets spit venom at the selfish rich of Israel. Amos prophesies: *"I will not revoke the punishment, because they sell the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals— those who*

trample the head of the poor into the dust of the earth and turn aside the way of the afflicted" (Amos 2:6-7). He's hardly alone, but I only have so much space to write here!

I highly doubt that restricting access to abortions in the way that is planned in the United States poses any real obstacle to those of moderate means. For those who have the money to be choosy about their health insurance (or have it at all), who are able to cross state lines in their own vehicles, and who can take a few days off work to recover from an operation, these restrictions will be easy to circumvent. The well-off will find ways to hide the act they condemn; the poor alone will face the reality of being actually unable to access an abortion.

I have serious concerns about the justice of a law that seems poised to do little more than muscle the poor out of the abortion market. It may surprise you to hear after all this that I would generally identify myself as pro-life. But I say that because I believe that every baby deserves to be cared for in a loving family. The way to accomplish that is not, I believe, by restricting abortion access. Instead, efforts should be made to reduce the legitimate fears that women face when they find out they are unexpectedly pregnant. Subsidized day cares, legally mandated parental leave, the child benefit paid to parents, these are the more effective life-saving tools that demand pro-life support, not anti-abortion legislation.

I want to make clear that in this I am speaking for myself only. You do not need to agree with me just because I'm a minister, and I've learned and grown much from the faith and experiences of this congregation. I am open to discussion with any whose earnest desire is to see our world transformed into the way God actually wants it to be, and I know we can sometimes disagree on the way to get there. Yet I believe that despite our differences, we are still one body. Our variety of opinions can lead to a variety of cares, and that is a good thing in a world so diverse and complex. We are all loved by God, and we all have a place in God's family.

When we face modern issues in the news, may we care for the "least of these". We are, as followers of Christ, called to care for the vulnerable and the weak. God's love came down to us in Jesus Christ,

learning what it is like to be helpless and dependent. May we care for those who do not have the protection of financial security or political clout. May we seek to better the world with love and support rather than force. May we follow the way of Christ, and speak what we believe to be true when we are given the opportunity. Because God has plans for this world, by the grace of God things will change. With God in charge, that is Good News.
