Mission Moment – Sunday, May 8

Presbyterians Sharing is transforming lives in Central America and Mexico.

Based in Guatemala, General Coordinator Judith Castañeda and the staff of the Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America (CEDEPCA) are empowering women and girls through their ministry of accompaniment. Women learn how to take on leadership roles in churches and their communities through faith-based activities about their personal and legal rights, and the importance of formal education. After completing CEDEPCA's Healthy Relationships course, one woman said, "I feel like a different woman. Before, I used to live locked in my home with a domestic routine, but now I have new friends, we do creative things."

From St. David's Auxiliary (Atlantic Mission Society)

Gracious God, we bring to you the PWS&D project in Guatemala that is promoting entrepreneurship among Indigenous women. Be with those participating in this program now and those who benefitted from it in the past. Guide the staff who provide community members with training in small business development. Amen.

Message from the Minister:

This Mother's day, my boys and I will be celebrating without Michelle. That's because she is on a ten-day trip to Ontario all by herself, coming back on the 16th. Her sister is getting married in the fall, so Michelle is visiting to help with a wedding shower and, let's be honest, revel in the time all to herself without two preschoolers to look after 24/7.

So far, we're only a couple days in, and things are going very well. I'm usually the cook anyways, I know the routines backwards and forwards, and our province's wonderfully subsidized daycare is also coming in very helpful. For the most part, everyone is happy.

That being said, there were of course some tears at bedtime when mommy wasn't there to sing songs or brush teeth or give a goodnight hug and kiss. We miss her, it is sad, and there's no way to dodge that reality completely. But "though the tears may last for (about fifteen minutes of) the night, joy cometh with the morning", and we made it through that sadness.

We all have suffering in our lives. No-one gets to dodge it completely or slap a smile on it and have everything be good all the time. That's a part of living on this earth, a product of the decay, scarcity and separation in our world that defines sin. We can't sugar-coat it sometimes; sometimes mom is just a thousand miles away and we just have to live through it until tomorrow.

But there's a lesson I hope my kids learn from this: even if Mom isn't there, everything turns out ok. They are loved and cared for, they do not need to fear. I hope they learn to love her more and need her less.

I myself remember lessons learned from suffering. I remember the daily poverty of living as a student in Montreal supported only on Michelle's cafe work, suffering the stress of poverty and realizing that I needed to give thanks every night that I had food and shelter for tomorrow, that I could rest with certainty that for at least the next day God would keep us safe. That suffering taught me to pursue contentment.

"We boast in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not put us to shame" Romans 5:2-5

What lessons have you learned from your suffering? Remember those times when things were hard, when pain was fresh, when money was tight, illness reared it's head, or death snatched someone away. That suffering was real, it can't be avoided. We have faith that God will undo all our suffering, even defeat death. But even if tomorrow's redemption can only help us so much today, we can sometimes see that redemption starting to work already in the lessons we learn and the ways our suffering produces virtue in us, teaching us to value what we have, to have compassion for those who suffer as we once did, or to repent of the bad choices that brought our suffering upon us.

So as we wait and pray for relief from our suffering, may we also have the strength to learn from it. May my boys learn they don't *need* Mommy to sing them a song (or two, or three...), even if they will still undoubtedly love to have her sing them. May I learn that I can ask for help when I need it. And then on that blessed day when she returns, may we all enjoy the double blessing of the suffering undone while the lessons remain. And if we trust in Christ, we know that's the way all suffering will end. What Good News that is for us!

Appeal for Help from John Chol

Many of you know about John Chol. He was an active member of St. David's until he and his family moved to Ottawa. Some 7-8 years ago, John initiated the development of a village church and school in the rural area of South Sudan. St. David's supported this project and helped to deliver choir gowns, bibles, and many school supplies.

Steve Bruneau received a note from John last week. Here's part of that note:

John continues to work in our name on the school project we have in Dendor, South Sudan. He is there now and we have been doing a few things to get our school re-licenced etc.

Quite apart from all that, John has been visited by some challenges and the very-recent tragic death of his brother in the village of Dendor. The brother, Chakuen, received the bibles we sent them ten years ago as some of you may recall. Sadly he was killed by raiding cattle thieves which has led to John Chol returning to the village to try and support his family. The message below is an appeal for support.

I understand how far removed we are from all this and so I don't wish to make any presumptions – I was asked to forward the note and thus I am doing so.

Feel free to write me with questions or comments, Ill try to answer.

And John's note:

Thanks for the comfort. I have never lack of faith believing that God is there for me and everything has an end. I have safely arrived in Juba. I will be proceeding to Lankien when I get a flight to Lankien.

I need St David members to pray for me and my family because I have gone through a lot.

Few things that you and your family or anyone from St David should help with is to take Chakuen's kids to the Refuge camp in Kenya or Uganda. There is no food at home, and cattle were taken. We just brought sacks of sorghum for at least and biscuits for kids as they have been crying looking for milk as they usually get milk from the cows. Chakuen has 4 wives and multiple kids. Nobody will take this big responsibility to feed them. I need your support to a small airplane from Lankien to Juba, and they can be transported by road to Uganda or Kenya. I am just appealing to all members of St. David. I was not aware about this when I decided to come South Sudan this year.
