## Minister's Message

Today's picture came from my trip back to Ontario with my family, specifically from a visit to The Museum in Kitchener. We got there in time to see a show with a very special guest: Maverick the T-Rex!

You can see Oliver is enjoying it, and Orson did too. The kids sitting next to us... not so much. In a brief pause from the excitement, maybe even when this picture was being taken, Oliver turned to me and said "It's not a *real* dinosaur though...?" It was as if he was both reassuring me that I didn't need to be scared while at the same time double-checking that his assumption was correct, and this wasn't a real T-Rex stomping around the room.



For us adults, watching the T-Rex was fun too. You wonder how the person fits inside, how they make him open and close his mouth, blink his eyes, and even roar. You wonder how they can see at all, and how stuffy it is in there. But even more interesting than watching the dinosaur is watching the kids, because you get to watch some of them believe this IS a real dinosaur, and react with burning curiosity and trepidation.

As I was thinking about this experience, I realized it's a little bit like worship services at St. David's. When we worship together, we welcome the mighty King of Kings into our midst, stronger and older than any T-Rex. But like poor Maverick, I wonder how often we fail to believe he is real. God's arrival should make us curious, nervous, intimidated, empowered, and more. We can choose how to respond: treating what we see and hear as real and important, or dismissing it as an entertaining show.

It's my hope that you will recognize how great God is today, and how amazing it is that he walks at your side every day. I hope that you do not forget that the King we worship is the real and true King of the world, roaring against injustice and devouring evil. When you open scripture, when you open your heart in prayer, when you join us for worship, you will find an amazing God. That's Good News!

**Dear members of St. David's congregation:**

I hope you are doing well today!

September is Hunger Action Month and I know that food security is an important issue for you. I won't sugarcoat things: August was our busiest month so far this year as thousands of people in the metro region have been profoundly impacted by the soaring cost of rent and food prices--and people haven't even turned their heat on yet. This will spike another increase in demand from those living on a limited income, like our most vulnerable: seniors.

It has been a tough few years for so many of us, but we must not give up, as most of us are only a paycheque or two from having to use a food bank ourselves.

I can't help but feel even more determined during these unprecedented times to help those who are suffering from hunger. As the Executive Director I have seen firsthand, again and again, how people like YOU step up and refuse to accept that our neighbours go hungry.

Personally, I have been doing my best to see these challenges as opportunities to help more people. One of the questions I often reflect on is, "How do we make the most impact to those who are food insecure? And are we being inclusive and accessible to those people?"

So, in October we will be increasing our hours of operation and opening on Wednesday evenings for the first time to help address the increased demand, especially for people who work during the day but can no longer make ends meet.

## **From the Archives**

This week we have a little something different to share with you. During our WA meeting this past week, Heather, brought along a 1-page document she found while going through some of Jim's papers. It turned out to be something that her mother, Frances Steele created. It pertained to a WA event – the Flipper Dinner. It appears that Frances had the daunting task of organizing the dish-washing effort. Just remember, this was prior to our acquisition of a commercial dishwasher!! Needless to say, Frances had everything well in hand!

Thanks Heather for this lovely flashback to years gone by and the people who meant so much to us.

## DISHWASHING AT THE FLIPPER DINNER

These comments are suggestions only, as we have done things somewhat differently each year.

### Equipment

1. Lots of plastic containers:
  - 3 Dishpan size for receiving and sorting cutlery.
  - 3 (at least) larger size for receiving dinner plates.
  - 2 for tumblers and dessert plates.
  - 2 (at least) for cups
  - 1 " " " saucers
  - 1 Slop Pail for emptying juice tumblers and cups.
2. Dish Detergent and lots of cup towels Tray and rack for draining..
3. 1 dozen regular size garbage bags. (This number is needed as bags need to be doubled to prevent accidental breaking).
4. Tea kettles to heat extra water.

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There seem to be four parts to the wash up:

1. The main course:- dinner plates, knives and forks.
  - Adequate table space (2 tables, if room) outside the kitchen for the first course only.
  - Three receivers are necessary because dishes come so quickly, one to take and sort cutlery, two to scrape and stack dinner plates, and deal with the garbage.
2. Rinsing. Rinsing is best done in the kitchen, at least two rinsers, as all dishes **MUST BE RINSED** (to conserve hot water, and other obvious reasons)
  - Dessert plates, tumblers, cups and saucers, etc. can be brought directly to the kitchen window.
3. Dish washing and drying.
4. Putting dishes back in proper places.
