Mission Moment – Sunday, December 4th

“Where is God in all of this oppression and injustice?” Upon hearing the anguished cries of Palestinian Christians, Palestinian clergy felt it was crucial to respond pastorally and remind them that God is the God of justice, the God who cares about the oppressed. These Christians need God’s hope. In 1989, Palestinian Christian theologians developed a theology that could be shared with fellow Palestinian believers. This led to the establishment of Sabeel Ecumenical Liberation Theology Center in Jerusalem, an ecumenical grassroots liberation theology movement. **Presbyterians Sharing supports Sabeel and Director, Omar Haramy, in standing with the oppressed, working for justice and engaging in peacebuilding.**

Minister's Message

This week, as part of our busy service of Peace, we will be placing three new leaves on our Memorial Tree in the sanctuary. Each leaf bears the name of someone who served this congregation faithfully, and has now died and left us with a legacy worth remembering. Their names are Jim Steele, Peter Clouston, and Marjorie Pike, and I know from personal experience and from hearing many stories just how well loved they were and what a profound spiritual impact they have had here at St. David's. A place on our memorial tree cannot be bought, it is earned by a life of faithfully sowing the seeds of the kingdom with whatever gifts God has given you.



One aspect of creation that I find especially beautiful is the way that God left the job unfinished. Creation was not made to stay the same, creation was made to keep creating! Trees grow to produce seeds and create new trees. People create new, totally unique people by new combinations of ourselves. The work is not done, and there are new creations made today that have never been seen in all of history.

We can remember the faith of others and the legacy they created among us in exactly the same way. The gifts they have given aren't just reflected in our building, a chosen pew, or a little leaf mounted to our memorial tree. The real gift we remember is one that has created something altogether new. We can't fully measure what they've given us in dollars, bricks, or even years. We can't really measure it at all, just as the acorn can't measure what was given to it by the oak tree.

So may we give thanks for our own sprouting faith and for our church today. For it will continue to grow and change, and over the years it may come to look very different than the church of those we remember on our memorial tree. That is right and good, just as the acorn grows into a new tree slightly different than its parent. What they have left us is not a tree, it is a seed. We have been given tools to take our next steps, to grow, create, and produce fruit of our own. That is Good News worth celebrating.

This week's thanks

Each year we get a lovely swag and large wreath from the McKenzies and this year was no exception. The swag is over the door leading from the sanctuary to the hall and the big wreath is over the main door of the church. Our sanctuary is also living up to the season thanks to Janet Calver and Brian Gamberg who got the banners in place, the tree up and the manger in its place. I believe the final touches will happen when the younger set drop by to complete the decorations. It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas!

I'd also like to thank Ian Bruneau who sent the summarized PAD details needed by me. Then there's Heather Morrissey who is working diligently to ensure our renters and our own members are warm and happy while they are in our building. Thursday she was running back and forth checking on the heat to see how it was doing. Warm wishes and thanks!

Fiscal Updates

You've been reading about some of the challenges this church now faces and some of the things we can all do to help.

This week we got the next Irving payment notice and they don't know what to do about the price of oil either. They are still using last year's rate for our annual monthly price, it's still at last year's rate of \$1,535 per month. We will see what happens as we move forward and the price of oil rises and falls. Meanwhile, I continue to calculate what the federal carbon tax may do to our oil costs for 2023.

Our problem with the heat on the stage continues, it is a work in progress with the continuing difficulty getting parts for the repairs. So, I've called in a company to start the work needed for H&R Mechanical to do their thing and I've suggested we use the "new" actuator in the old kitchen and replace it with a newer one. What did we learn on Thursday? DO NOT USE THE FANS.

The heat comes up faster when the fans are not working! A new sign is in place.

This week I received the details from Ian Bruneau for the distribution of monies received through the PAD. Yes, there is a small spreadsheet with the details of how we're doing. To the end of November contributions were \$8,611.35 and if we have the same donation via PAD (\$556.40) in December, only \$116.25 is required through e-transfers or Sunday envelopes to meet our 2022 commitment of \$9,284 as voted on and passed in the ACM. Should more than \$116.25 be donated that amount will be sent and if it's a bit less I will write out a cheque to meet our commitment.

As I write out the final cheques for 2022, the expenses are continuing to rise and our income is simply not keeping pace, even with the \$42,000 received from the St. Aiden's Fund back in June.

Minister's Christmas Appeal

I have a very clear memory from the birth of my eldest son, standing in the birthing room holding my wife's hand and watching the doctor holding him up in the moments after he was delivered. He was red and squishy, as most newborns are and his eyes were closed. What I really remember though, was the very first time I saw him move, as his arms trembled a bit and pulled in towards his chest; I remember thinking that suddenly there was a whole other person in the room, someone new with a new body and a new will.

In the season of Christmas, we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, who came into the world in a very similar way. Christmas is a time of new beginnings, a new baby moving for the first time, a new family, a new relationship between God and creation, a new future opening up for the world! This was an unexpected and novel event, as the King came to dwell, not in the holiest and most sacred inner courts of the temple, but in a feeding trough in a backwater stable. The birth was made holy, not by incense, golden ornaments, or the fanfare of trumpets, but by the actions of a simple human family that welcomed God among them, nursed him, cradled him, and loved him. This season, we remember that Christmas is not about fancy surroundings, but about starting something new with love at the start.

Here at St. David's, we are excited to find ourselves in a time of change. I have spent nearly half of my time here under COVID lockdowns, so our full and busy schedule of Advent activities this year brings such joy to my heart! We are a vibrant community, and having the chance to bring joy and laughter to seniors with our Good Companions group, worship with the wonderful music of the Tenacious String Orchestra, and even share a simple cup of coffee after the service again is a powerful reminder of the love for God and neighbour that motivates all we do.

That being said, it will be no surprise to you to learn that COVID has been a hard time for our church. With in-person services suspended and no groups looking to rent our spaces during the week, we were glad for the opportunity presented by the federal government to participate in the CEBA program, which allowed us to receive an interest-free loan of \$40,000 to help us through the last few years. We are now looking to repay that loan, and I believe that with your help we can do it!

We have already saved up \$10,000 to put towards the loan. Significantly, the Government only requires \$30,000 to be repaid IF payment is made within the next year. Although we still have a years worth of time to try to save and raise the last \$20,000, we have chosen to make a special appeal to you, as a member of the congregation, to ask if you would be willing to help us pay down the loan so that we can focus our attention on new initiatives and ministries instead of recovering from the last few years.

I know this has been a hard time for many, so I hope that even if you are not able to contribute financially to this "Pay Off the Loan" appeal you will still consider taking new steps this year to support our ministries with volunteering your time and energy. We would welcome your support for our seniors group, our community meals, the Bridges to Hope food bank, our children's ministry, our work with refugees, or perhaps with a new ministry idea that God has placed on your own heart!

As we look to the manger, we remember that God can use even the smallest gifts to do great things. With your help, the future of this city and this world will be shaped by the love that filled that stable. This is a time of new beginnings, of new hope and new compassion. To you and yours, Merry Christmas, and may God fill your holidays with every blessing that truly matters.

Last week the question was: Just over 100 years ago in 1920, the church lost two stalwarts. Who were they and what did they do?

The answer is: The two members who died: on January 29 1920 the master carpenter Edward Thomas of Lookout Farm, he was 86 years old, he build the Queen's Road church, the LSPU Hall (on the site of the Second Meeting House) and a smaller version of the Queen's Road church in Pool's Cove at that mission. Later in the year Mrs. Agnes Langmead died, a long time President of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Home Missionary Society.

Recent History:

Last week the question was: What are the colors for the candles on the Advent wreath and what do they mean?

The answer is: There are five candles on the Advent wreath, three purple, one pink and a large white candle. The first candle is purple and it represents **Hope**. The second candle is also purple, it represents **Peace**. The third candle is pink and it represents **Joy**. Purple again for the fourth candle representing **Love**. And lastly the large white candle, it is the **Christ Candle**.
