Mission Moment – Sunday, November 27th

Raamia fled to Pakistan with her daughter after divorcing her abusive husband in Afghanistan. As a single mother, Raamia made and sold handicrafts to support herself and her daughter, Zainab. On their way to the city of Lahore, she and her daughter got into an accident. Her daughter was unharmed, but Raamia was severely injured, resulting in her arm having to be amputated. After the accident, she could not continue working on her handicrafts. Raamia and her daughter were selected to receive cash support from a project by Community World Service Asia, a Presbyterian World Service & Development partner. "I was able to buy some food supplies with the money I received," she said. **This project is helping refugee families who have fled Afghanistan since the Taliban takeover.**

Minister's Message

"Hope" is the thing with feathers BY EMILY DICKINSON

'"Hope" is the thing with feathers -That perches in the soul -And sings the tune without the words -And never stops - at all -

And sweetest - in the Gale - is heard -And sore must be the storm -That could abash the little Bird That kept so many warm -

I've heard it in the chillest land -And on the strangest Sea -Yet - never - in Extremity, It asked a crumb - of me.'



On this week leading up to the first Sunday of Advent, the Sunday of Hope, I wanted to share a story of hope that I first heard many years ago. Like most stories of hope, it begins in an unexpected place, in this case at a funeral! An elderly lady had died, and had left behind a document outlining her funeral wishes for her family. They were glad to have the help and certainty that such a document can bring, but there was one particular item that confused them. She had asked that she be buried with a fork in her hand! "A fork?" they wondered when they read the strange request, "What on earth for?" But the instructions were clear, and as they read on they learned the reason.

"Many times in my life" she wrote, "I have eaten a lovely meal and thanked my host as they cleared the plates and cutlery from the table. The best meals, though, are the ones where the busy host tells me to keep my fork, because the best is yet to come, before returning from the kitchen with a marvelous dessert."

Just as she kept her fork at those meals because "the best is yet to come", she wanted to proclaim even in her death that something better was coming for her, the resurrection life promised by Jesus Christ!

May we, too, be people who believe that the best is yet to come. As the Psalmist says, "weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning." (Psalm 30:5). We look forward to the morning, we believe in it, and we have a hope that can never be taken away from us. No matter how dark things may get, how stormy the seas or how strong the gale may blow, we have Hope that the best is yet to come, a reality of hope, peace, joy and love. You've been reading about some of the challenges this church now faces and some of the things we can all do to help.

This week I'm taking a second look at the budget for next year and trying to come up with a number for our furnace oil costs. This week's announcement that we're moving to the federal carbon tax does have implications for us. The calculations continue.

Our problem with the heat on the stage continues, it is difficult to get parts for several reasons, the age of our equipment, shortages caused by downtime in factories and supply line disruptions. The renters have moved to other locales in the building and I'm trying to keep the fans moving in the hall. Should you ever see them off, please call the office so we can get them going again. They are designed to move the hot air aloft down towards the floor. To everyone who wonders about the heat in the hall, how does it work: there are two thermostats which control the heat in the hall. The one on the east wall outside the "old" kitchen manages the radiators on the north wall while the thermostat in the Armour Room warms that room AND the radiators on the south side of the hall.
