#### Happy New Year to all our readers!

#### Minister's Message



Christmas has come and gone, and the more industrious among us have begun to clear away the decorations and prepare for the new year. I am not one of them, but I will say that I've at least *looked* at my Christmas decorations and *thought* about putting them away. But the tree hasn't dropped too many needles yet, and it still looks beautiful and festive, so for now I think it will stay up (at least in our house).

It did get me thinking about the process of putting away all those delicate little ornaments though, and the experience of boxing them up now to bring them back out next time, unwrapping and admiring each one again. I thought it reminded me of what grief is like. At first, grief is an ornament that hangs right in front of you, and can't be escaped. Then, it finds new places to hang; on a chair that used to belong to someone, on a song you shared together, or on the smell of their perfume. Each time you see it, you remember. In my case, it's a bit literal, since we have two little paw-print ornaments we got last year to put pictures of our cats in, not knowing neither of them would make it to this Christmas.

Eventually, you may be able to put the ornament away sometimes, and bring it out when you want to remember. The grief may be less intrusive, but it isn't really gone, either. It's just carefully stored, preserved, ready for next time.

But this is also the hope of one of my biggest hopes, because of what I know the Bible says about Heaven. See, Heaven is the land where you bring your box of grief, and the ornaments are transformed. The bitterness will be gone, the sweet will remain, and we will no longer suffer the loss of those things because loss will be no more. I have grief that I will carry with me all of my life, guarded close to my heart and packaged lovingly away. But there will be a heavenly tree for my ornaments one day, the grief will be transformed to joy, and then I will never put them away aga

## **Treasurer's Announcement**

In Nov 2022, I was concerned that there would be insufficient funds to pay all our bills for 2022 and took that message to Session. An appeal was announced and although we did not meet the full "ask", we were able to pay all 2022 salaries, bills and donations to others (Presbyterian Sharing, Bridges to Hope, PWS&D, Ukraine support, ANC House, AMS and the WA). However, we will be in the same state come February when we will have to dip into our Line of Credit (LOC) to pay our people, suppliers and the PCC.

What is going on with our finances? Like everyone else our expenses are rising and our income is shrinking. One example is our fuel bill. We are on a monthly pay plan and for the 2021 – 2022 plan period we were paying \$1,535 each month. However, at the end of the pay plan period in November 2022 we received a notice that we had an outstanding balance of \$3,711.43 due and payable. Our new monthly payment is \$2,597. That is just one example.

At the last Annual Congregational Meeting (ACM) a \$55,000 deficit budget was passed. At the start of 2022 we had \$12,000 in a sinking fund to pay the government loan due Dec 31, 2023. For the first half of the year I put off what bills I could, I used the full LOC and dipped into the sinking fund when necessary to pay our people and what bills I could not defer. In June we received \$42,000 from the St. Aiden's Fund, allowing me to start paying off the LOC and some of our suppliers. That got us to November.

Enough of the bad news. I would like to thank all those who contribute to our church in so many ways, not just monetarily. Thanks to everyone who contributed to the Special Appeal and to those who have made the decision to up their monthly givings. It's never too late to make a donation!

If you have some thoughts or suggestions on what to do and how to proceed, I would indeed welcome them.

Please look at the following trivia question, to see the evolution of the church during 1926. A time much like the one we are now.

#### **Church Trivia Questions**

For some time now, I have been leading up to an upcoming anniversary in 2025 - the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this church.

#### Way back when:

Last week the question was: Was there any celebration of the church's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1925?

The answer is: 1925 was a bad year: declining membership, decreased offerings, sad losses including beloved Sunday School teacher Miss Lillian Cowan, and much needed repairs. So, at the annual meeting of the congregation (a contentious affair by all reports) a decision to mortgage the Allendale property was made. But nothing was allowed to spoil the year's great event, the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary lasting for a full week. Sunday Oct 18<sup>th</sup> His Excellency the Governor was at the 11 am service and Professor J. L. Paton MA recently appointed Principal of Memorial College addressed the 7 pm service. Other services were held throughout the week culminating in the Oct 25<sup>th</sup> services, with Rev. Power of the Kirk at the 11 am service and the 7 pm service was conducted by Rev. McDermott from the Fortune Bay Mission.

This week the question is: What happened in 1926 - another bad year?

Answer: They took out a bank loan, the last English minister left, the church was visited six times by the General Secretary of the British & Foreign Bible Society in Canada and Newfoundland – none other than Rev. J. B. M. Armour (father of Rev. J. S. S. Armour). The Queen's Road Church evolved into a small congregation of faithful people who worshipped regularly, had Communion once a month and operated on an annual budget of between \$3,500 and \$4,000. They found a way to survive.


