


News from the Pews for Pentecost Sunday, May 28th, 2023

Minister's Message



Saint Paul Writing His Epistles, by Valentin de Boulogne (c. 16th century)

This week in our Wednesday Bible study, we came across an interesting trouble with the biblical text we were looking at. In three of the four Gospels, Mark, Matthew, and John, the story of Jesus feeding the 5000 is immediately followed up by the story of Jesus walking on water. We talked about how we see Jesus' humanity in needing to take time away from the crowds as he often did, time to pray and be we God, and how amazing the transformation of his disciples is. They go from trembling fishermen who think the figure walking across the waves is a ghost to boldly preaching the Gospel as leaders of the church at Pentecost, and that can give us hope that we, too, can be transformed in unexpected ways by God's Spirit. But the question that I found really interesting to look into was about the gospel that DOESN'T have the story of Jesus walking on water: Luke! It is widely thought that Luke and Matthew both used the earlier gospel of Mark for inspiration when writing their own gospels, with most of the text of Mark directly copied over and expanded upon in different ways. But after the feeding of the 5000 in Luke, something odd happens. Luke loses touch with the narrative from Mark, and doesn't record the next few stories, including Jesus walking on water, stories of several healings, and a few of his debates with the Pharisees.

Scholars aren't entirely sure why Luke does this, as there isn't a clear theological or narrative reason for Luke to ignore these stories. I've seen it called the "Great Omission", and as I tried to research reasons for this strange difference between the gospels I came across ideas like this one:

"Upon coming to Mark 6:45-52, in which Bethsaida is mentioned, [Luke] decided to omit it. Looking away or being distracted, he accidentally focussed on Mark 8:22, where Bethsaida is again mentioned. Thinking he was looking at the first reference to Bethsaida, he began to use the material from Mark again."

Oops! In a moment, I am transported to Luke's side, because this is a problem I can relate to! Which one of us hasn't accidentally skipped a line while reading or copying something down?

Now, this might not be a satisfying answer to some people, but I find hope in it. Luke was, after all, just a human being. The Gospels were written by human hands, moved by the Spirit to share a message they thought was all-important. Through the ages, God has worked through people, and does amazing things despite our shortcomings.

So if you are the sort of person who makes mistakes, come to our sanctuary and look at the stained glass windows adorned with images of saints like Luke. Remember that they also made mistakes. But what unites us to them is the deeper

message, the truth of the Gospels that inspired them to write so convincingly; we are not perfect, but God's Love is. Saints begin as amateurs, what Good News that is!

Treasurer's Update for this Week

The current state of our finances has again become more dire. To pay all the endmonth and month-start cheques we will again dip into the Line of Credit (LOC) for another \$2,000. This will mean that we have used \$6,000 of our \$10,000 LOC. This is not sustainable.

If you are wondering what I'm not paying, basically those are PCC related charges. There are two things in that category which I should be paying. Those are the stipend related charges – pension and group insurance – which are under federal legislation and which should be paid if at all possible.

While our finances are not good, we do get regular monthly donations (PAD, on Sundays, E-transfers) and from increasing rentals. Please consider this as you make choices about your donations to the church.

What would you do for your Church?

I think that sometimes we forget that we are a church and what that means to each of us and to our congregation. Basically, we are a group of people who meet, mainly on Sundays, to attend a service. We also run into one another throughout the week, by taking part in the various groups at St. David's, or we call and speak to one another. That is called being part of a community.

The following is a description of a service I attended back on May 7th at Lady Cove.

Written Sunday May 7th I attended church at Lady Cove. The minister went around before the service and greeted each and every person there. By the time the service started we were all relaxed and chatting with the people in the pews around us. Not unlike St. David's. The service was basically the same, however there was a spot where the minister says "I'd like to wish Beth a happy birthday!" and asked "is there anyone else that you'd like to acknowledge? A birthday,

anniversary, graduation, any special thoughts." So, the congregation came up with birthdays, a trip to Ottawa to visit grandchildren, a son's retirement. There being six or seven birthdays, we sang "Happy birthday".

The sermon was on living stones. There are two ways to build with stone. In the first way, you cut them out to exactly fit where they are laid. Breakage is possible depending on how they're cut or if they're not tightly fitted and exactly match the surrounding stones. The second way is to gather many stones and choose the ones which will be going into the building. This is cumbersome in selection and slow to build. You find a hole, choose a stone carefully and see if it fits. The parable was that people are the same. You find someone who seems to fit the gap, maybe with a bit of chipping away at this or that. Or it may be necessary to do a bit of chipping away at the neighbouring "stones", but heaven help you if you just stuff them into the hole, since the outcome might not be what you want.

The minister ended the service by saying she was going to attend a convocation on May 14th. This convocation was for a new minister whom she had mentored for the past five years. That course was a Summer Distance Master Divinity (MDiv) course where classes are taken online over the fall and winter and the summer terms are in person at the Atlantic School of Theology. In five years, the student earns their MDiv all the while serving in a supervised ministry setting.

After the service we continued our chatting back and forth as we each left the church, going out to our respective cars (in the sunshine).

On this past Wednesday I dropped by a relative's house, chatted about many things and learned that there's a United Church Women's (UCW) garage sale on Thursday. Gently used clothing and shoes, housewares, and books were being welcomed and to be dropped off at the small community center at 7 pm, so I promptly went home to gather several items for the sale. Yes, the UCW and our WA have a lot in common!

Getting back to St. David's and again speaking of the chance meeting I had with a woman at the last Bridge Party, who said "This is my church." Many years ago she attended this church, had kids, and played the piano for the Sunday School. She still kept a card from Rev. Jim Armour congratulating her on the birth of her

daughter. I'd like to know if anyone has any ideas on how can we reach the people who say we are their home church and bring them home again?

We do welcome all types of participation, big and small, from everyone. I'm renewing my call: if there are any things that you'd like, or hope, to see happen, if you see a need we can undertake, or if you would just like to talk about our finances or the church and its outreach programs, please get in touch! <u>Mission Moment – Presbyterian World Service & Development</u> Sunday, May 28th, 2023



With support from Presbyterians Sharing, Two Rivers Church in Guelph, Ontario, is exploring new and creative ways of being the church. This ministry is made up of "living rooms," where people gather together in homes for meals and conversations that draw them deeper into friendship and spiritual formation in Christ.
