Minister's Message



Winter seems to be arriving with gusto this year, but when I was picking up Oliver from school one day this week I found myself thinking of springtime. One of my favourite springtime experiences is digging through a pile of snow to find plants underneath, green and growing. I distinctly remember marveling last year when I uncovered my thyme plant in the herb garden and saw how happy it seemed to be, almost as if it hadn't noticed winter at all and had just gone on growing underneath the snow for the whole winter! This Sunday marks the second Sunday in advent, the Sunday of Peace. In John's Gospel. when Jesus is preparing to face the cross, he tells his disciples: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." It is a promise of comfort when the hard times are looming, a reassurance that in Christ we have a peace beyond the world's understanding.

Those plants under the snow remind me of the peace that Christ offers, the

peace that I long to have in my life. No matter the storms that rage, no matter how dark the nights or how deep the drifts, that thyme in my herb garden is green beneath the snow, untroubled and thriving.

This season, may we all remember the gift of Peace that Christ offers us. May our spirits be preserved with the grace and good humour of the Kingdom against every obstacle and difficulty of this world. May the love of God and our certainty of God's provision keep us fresh and growing no matter our situation.

May God give you peace that the world cannot take away, peace that rules quietly in your heart until the once-mighty ice is broken and melted away. May you be free of anxiety, filled with laughter, free of fear, filled with gladness, free of anger, and filled with compassion. For in Christ, we can find Peace that endures all things. What Good News that is!

The Meaning of White Gift Sunday

The tradition of White Gift Sunday has its roots in a small Methodist church in Ohio in 1904. What began as a humble way to reflect on the love and devotion of the giver and not the value of the gift has grown into today's white gift services in many churches across several denominations.

The story is told that a minister's wife initiated the idea to solve the problem of inequity of gifts given at the Sunday School Christmas party. Instead of focusing on receiving gifts, the focus shifted to bringing gifts to Jesus that could in turn be shared with people around the world who did not have much. All the gifts would come wrapped in plain white paper, so that no one would know which was an expensive gift and which was a more modest one. No one would feel ashamed of their gift and everyone would share in the joy of giving to others.

Here at St. David's, we have observed White Gift Sunday for many years during the season of Advent. In keeping with the spirit of the first White Gift service, all those attending would bring a gift of toys, food, personal care items, etc. all wrapped in white paper or in a white bag. **This year,** on the three Sundays in Advent, please bring a gift if you are able, for a child, youth, man or woman. The gifts will be distributed to various organizations in the city before Christmas. Food items will be either included with the Christmas Hampers or given to Bridges To Hope.

This is one way we can show God's love and our caring commitment to the people of our community. Please consider how you can help.

Mission Moment for December 10th



In northern Ghana, people living with disabilities face a range of issues, such as widespread poverty, limited access to livelihood opportunities and health care, and social barriers to full inclusion. Political, environmental, and economic challenges work together to create those difficult conditions. PWS&D works with the Presbyterian Church of Ghana in a Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) program to address these challenges through vocational skills training programs such as soap and pomade making. Ateni Lois, a participant in the soap-making class, expresses her gratitude, stating, "We are so grateful to the CBR program and PWS&D for equipping us with the skills to be able to produce soap and pomade for money. Very soon, we will be in good business and will be out of poverty in our respective communities."
