


News from the Pews for the First Sunday of Advent December 3rd, 23

Minister's Message



This Sunday marks the start of the church season of Advent, and thus the start of a new year in the church's calendar. It is a time of expectation, looking forward to Christmas and remembering the coming of Christ as a baby in a manger, and also looking forward to the return of Christ in glory. We cast our eyes forward with hope and faith, because we believe that God is good and God is mighty. In this day and age, it is not common for people to look to the future with hope, yet that is what our faith lets us do. This year at St. David's has been a busy one. Churches in Canada are struggling, and we are no exception. Our expenses are higher than the gifts we receive, and this threatens the long-term survival of our church. A changing culture means that regular attendance at Sunday morning worship is not the priority it once was for many people. Lives are busy, and long-term commitments are hard to make. People prefer to give charitably to specific causes rather than the institution of their local church, in part as a consequence of the sins of the wider Church like the residential school

system or systemic abuses of those within the LGBTQ+ community. Apologies have of course been made by every level of our church, but wounds like these do not heal quickly or easily.

In a time when the church struggles to reach people who would rather be out doing something else on a Sunday morning, it has been a joy for me to see the great effort that St. David's has put into reaching out to our community this year. After years of the church sitting empty during the pandemic, it is now hard to find a time when there isn't a group from our community using the building. In a city that is full of people who attend church less and less often, it is a good thing to be a church providing welcome and warmth to so many different groups.

There are so many people in our city, and the business of our church building highlights that reality. We could hardly be busier during the week. The question before us then, is how to grow our congregation. We are very good at attracting renters, but less familiar with attracting worshippers. This year, I hope you will join me in praying that we would find ways to invite others to participate in our worship, in our missions, and in our church family. Whether it be building bridges with rental groups, inviting people back who we haven't seen in a while, or hosting events that unchurched folks feel welcome to "come and try", please pray that we would reach the souls in need in our community.

For in this season of Hope, we know that the future of this town is in the hands of a loving God. May we discern a path forward that has us shine with the power of Christ's love in our community. May we make a difference in the lives of the little ones, feeding the hungry and visiting the lonely. May we preach the Gospel that fulfils the longing hearts, and proclaim hope and joy in a world of fear and bitterness.

I hope to see you at our Christmas services this year, and I invite you to consider what this church can be doing to be more reflective of Christ's love. Join us in worship and in making the world a better place. This is your church, and despite our struggles, we have resources enough to make a difference with your help.

with love for the Lord in their hearts. The world will not be made whole with riches, but with people acting with love for the Lord in their hearts. May we be those people!

The Meaning of White Gift Sunday

The tradition of White Gift Sunday has its roots in a small Methodist church in Ohio in 1904. What began as a humble way to reflect on the love and devotion of the giver and not the value of the gift has grown into today's white gift services in many churches across several denominations.

The story is told that a minister's wife initiated the idea to solve the problem of inequity of gifts given at the Sunday School Christmas party. Instead of focusing on receiving gifts, the focus shifted to bringing gifts to Jesus that could in turn be shared with people around the world who did not have much. All the gifts would come wrapped in plain white paper, so that no one would know which was an expensive gift and which was a more modest one. No one would feel ashamed of their gift and everyone would share in the joy of giving to others.

Here at St. David's, we have observed White Gift Sunday for many years during the season of Advent. In keeping with the spirit of the first White Gift service, all those attending would bring a gift of toys, food, personal care items, etc. all wrapped in white paper or in a white bag.

This year, on the three Sundays in Advent, please bring a gift if you are able, for a child, youth, man or woman. The gifts will be distributed to various organizations in the city before Christmas. Food items will be either included with the Christmas Hampers or given to Bridges To Hope.

This is one way we can show God's love and our caring commitment to the people of our community. Please consider how you can help.
