### Minister's Message



This spring was long, cold, and wet for us here in St. John's. A month ago, it felt like we would never escape the cold and dreary springtime, but then summer arrived with a vengeance to prove us wrong. It has been hot and humid, and like many of you, I've been feeling the effects of a heat that feels inescapably oppressive for Newfoundlanders used to cooler and windier weather. It doesn't help that so few places here have air conditioning, including my home! At least the church

building, with its cool concrete walls, has kept me comfortable here in my office during the day.

But finally, the weather feels like it is starting to cool off. I was lying in bed last night with the window open, and felt a cool breeze blow across me, enough for me to pull up the blanket for the first time in quite a few nights. Out of curiosity, I checked my phone to see what the temperature was now that it felt cooler, and saw that it was 21 degrees outside. "Twenty one?" I thought, "That's impossible, it feels much cooler than that!" After all, in the wintertime my house stays colder than 21 and it feels comfortable, so how could this objectively warm breeze feel so cool today?

Of course, this is a common experience. We all get used to the temperature around us and learn to adapt. Visit the tropics in the wintertime, and you can identify the locals by their long sleeves and pants amongst the tourists in their shorts and t-shirts. As this hot weather has gone on, we've become accustomed to the heat, and it takes a sudden blast of cold air to remind me of what the weather should be.

We can learn to live with many difficult things, and sometimes that ability to become comfortable isn't a good thing. The heat may be managable for us, but the heat is impacting more than just us. The waters of the Grand Banks off the coast of Newfoundland are more than five degrees

Celcius warmer than usual for this time of year, which is a massive change for the delicate marine ecosystems there, and has climate scientists worried about the impact these warmer waters might have on the hurricane season this year. The heat is a real problem, it's all around us, but we can so easily learn to forget it.

Scripture teaches us that this is the same sort of problem that we have when we face sin. Although God has designed us to pursue justice and peace, to love our neighbours and act as servants of all, we can so easily become used to other ways of doing things.

What have you grown used to that you know you really shouldn't? Do you carry bitterness in your heart, just because you're used to it by now? Are there relationships that have grown strained and empty of love that you should be investing in? Have you learned to hold back from helping your neighbours? Do you bring your worries and hopes to God in prayer?

We can so easily become used to things being not the way they should be. This goes for sin in our lives just as much as for the weather. Fortunately, changing our lives is much easier than changing the weather. May God give you the wisdom to notice that which you have grown used to, and the courage to try to make a change. For God promises new life, life that is changed and restored in ways that we had forgotten could be possible. What Good News that is!

# **News from the Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC)**

The PCC issues the Connection four (4) times a year. It is available on-line and we get several hard copies which are found on the ledge outside Rev. Sturtevant's office. Yesterday, the PCC sent out it's "Latest News from the PCC: Summer Edition and it includes an article of particular interest to members of our congregation who are Indigenous.

The Rev. Mary Fontaine, is Cree from Metabases and is the founder and executive director of Hummingbird Ministries, an Indigenous-led healing and reconciling ministry of the Presbytery of Westminster in British Columbia. Rev. Fontaine is also Moderator of the 2023 General Assembly, and she participated in the site selection ceremony of the National Residential Schools Monument on Parliament Hill on June 20, 2023. Call to Action #81 of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada states that "We call upon the federal government, in collaboration with Survivors and their organizations, and other parties to the Settlement Agreement, to commission and install a publicly accessible, highly visible, Residential Schools National Monument in the city of Ottawa to honour Survivors and all the children who were lost to their families and communities." Speakers at the ceremony included residential school Survivors as well as the Governor General of Canada, Her Excellency the Right Honorable Mary Simon. The Moderator was accompanied by the Rev. Dr. Karen Dimock, Minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Ottawa, and the Rev. Victor Kim, Principal Clerk of the PCC.

# Mission Moment – Presbyterian World Service & Development Sunday, July 30<sup>th</sup> 2023

Nadhifa, a single mother of seven in Somalia, had to relocate with her two oldest daughters and one-year-old son, Hamza, to a camp for internally displaced people after the drought caused her to lose her livelihood. She left her other four children behind with relatives, fearing for their survival. Nadhifa and her three children journeyed to the Dollow district to seek humanitarian assistance. During screening at the camp, Hamza was diagnosed with severe acute malnutrition. With the support of PWS&D, Hamza received treatment and recovered after a few weeks. In addition, Nadhifa participated in the infant and young child feeding community information session, where she gained valuable nutrition knowledge. "I feel relieved that my son's health has improved, and I can now search for



work to provide food for my children," she shared.
