Rev. David's Message



I think I have shared this piece of art before, but as we prepare for Good Friday and Easter Sunday, I found myself thinking of it again. I enjoy the "yuck" factor that Caravaggio brings to this scene, as Thomas lifts a flap of skin and truly tests the wound in Jesus' side. Just like in the bible story, this is a moment of raw truth, cutting through all of the hearsay and feeling for the indisputable reality of the wounds that Jesus suffered. Most of us wouldn't go that far, it's gross and weird, but Thomas makes absolutely sure.

It is remarkable that Jesus still bears these wounds, and this piece of art makes me wonder about all the physical questions: how deep does that wound go? Does it hurt him? If he moves about too much, will it open up again and start bleeding?

But more importantly, and more to the point of the bible story (I think), it makes me ask "why?" Why does Jesus still have this wound, after he has been raised to new life? Why wasn't it healed, as part of the process that gave him new life? He was dead for days, so clearly his body was restored

and repaired to some extent, but it is made very clear that these wounds remained, clear beyond a shadow of a doubt in Thomas' case.

Remember that for Thomas, this was important because he needed to be sure this was actually Jesus, and that he was real. The wounds proved his reality, and showed that there were no tricks. He had really been through it, and was standing before Thomas now.

May we recognize the power of our scars for our own testimony. May we not be afraid to admit the times we have suffered and the wounds we still carry. When we have endured much, may we not hide the signs, but proclaim what God has brought us through.

For there is no wound of body or of heart that God cannot redeem. No sorrow, no regret, no sickness, no death can hollow us out forever. For God can bring new joy and life to even the crucified and abandoned. That is our message of Good News for the world. And how can they know? Just look at the scars.

Obituary Announcement...

Theodore Bernard (Ted) Hoekman passed away peacefully and suddenly on March 12^{th} , while vacationing in Sarasota, Florida. Ted was born on November 1st, 1939, in Lethbridge, Alberta, to Thelma and Martin Hoekman. The family returned six years later to their native America, where Ted grew up. The family was part of a very large extended family to which Ted remained close, and he was proud of his Dutch ancestry. His education included a BSc from Hope College (Michigan) and a PhD from the University of Illinois, as well as a post-doc from Vanderbilt University (Tennessee). His first full-time academic appointment was at Georgetown University in Washington D.C. Fate brought him back to his country of birth when the new Medical School at Memorial University offered him a position, which he accepted and held for 30 years.

In addition to his scientific endeavours, Ted enjoyed walking, gardening, car mechanics, (especially his beloved VWs) computers and much more. In his 60s, biking became his passion. His other passion was choir singing. He was an original member of the Newfoundland Symphony Philharmonic Choir and also a member of the St. David's Church choir. His beautiful baritone voice and flawless singing made him a very welcome member of any choir. He loved fixing broken things and was generous with his help to many people. Over the years he bred and showed Dobermans, was a semi-professional photographer and was a consummate do-it-yourselfer, if he wanted to do something he taught himself how, culminating with building a house.

In 2007 Ted moved to Newbury, Ontario where he built a solar powered house mostly by himself and he also joined three different choirs. He loved road trips and traveled frequently to visit his children and grandchildren as well as other family members in Canada and the U.S. In the last twelve years he enjoyed spending a few months in Florida during the winter.

Ted is survived by his five children Derek, Jan, Alexia, Rafael and Raquel, his six grand-children Akari, Dustin, Sam, Annie, Luna and Ezra, his siblings Bob, Gladys, Phil and Trish, his first wife Phyllis and his second wife and best friend Elena Hannah, as well as his three stepchildren Arianne, Christopher and Adriel Eric Hannah. We will all miss him with his eternal Tilley hat, his self-deprecating humour, his quick mind and his unstinting support and help.

A celebration of Ted's life will be held in Newbury, Ontario, date to be announced.

Mission Moment for Sunday, March 31st, 2024



In Malawi, Madalitso Mphamba, a determined 16-year-old, once doubted she would ever have the chance to attend secondary school. When Madalitso's mother fell seriously ill and had to give up her job, they moved in with family for support. At first, Madalitso's grandma's beer brewing venture was thriving and played a crucial role in supporting her primary school education. However, Madalitso's grandmother eventually had to stop this business, and the family could no longer afford to send Madalitso to school. With help from PWS&D, the Blantyre Synod Education Department's Neno scholarship program allowed Madalitso to re-enroll, enabling her to dream of a brighter future
