Rev. David's Message



This Sunday, we will be following our usual practice of having our contemporary worship band play for the last Sunday of each month. Which instruments are used in church can sometimes be a thorny issue for people, although I know the majority of members at St. David's find they are able to worship in a variety of styles, which is in my opinion a good thing. Whenever I hear of debates kicking off between churchgoers about what the proper instruments of worship are, I find myself reflecting back on the history of music in the Presbyterian church and remembering that at one

time, not so very long ago, a very similar debate was being held over the inclusion of the newfangled "pipe organ" instrument in services of worship. Historically, Presbyterian churches tended to follow a strict, Reformed practice of music in worship. The only appropriate songs to be sung, it was felt, were the Psalms of the bible themselves. The only appropriate instrument was the voices of the worshippers. No contemporary songs like those that fill our hymnals today or instruments of any kind were to be found in worship.

Here is an extract from a 1867 publication of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, from a time when organs were just beginning to be found in Presbyterain sanctuaries. The article lists a dozen reasons for why the organ has no place in Christian worship, including:

"Instrumental music [...] has the effect of carnalizing the worship of God, by changing the spiritual service of praise into a sensuous, scientific performance, not always to the edification of the Church or to the glory of God, but too often for the honour of the musicians, and the gratification of the musical taste of the hearers. Thus the service of God is profaned, and the house of prayer turned into a concert-room."

"It destroys congregational singing [...]"

"'It is worshiping God by machinery."

As we come to the close of the Month of Music at St. David's, I hope we will remember the true breadth of music that has been used for worship over the years. Of course, we all have our favorite hymns, our favorite styles, and our favorite instruments. But praise in worship has always had more to do with the hearts of those worshipping than the instruments being played. Whether we play the organ or the drums, may our worship be to the Glory of God, may congregational singing be encouraged, and may we worship God with our hearts. May we keep open minds and hearts to appreciate the worship style of our neighbour! May we lift hearts to God in worship, no matter the accompaniment of the day or the decade. That is our enduring mission.

Dear St. David's Family,

The Reformed Parish in Csap/Chop, a congregation of the Reformed Church in Transcarpathia in western Ukraine, has been providing temporary shelter and food for people displaced by the war. Their social kitchen program includes hot food delivery to elderly congregation members who live alone and are unable to cook for themselves. With limited resources, Bishop Zan-Fabian reached out to the PCC for financial support to continue this ministry of care. The PCC provided a grant from Presbyterians Sharing, fulfilling the law of Christ to bear one another's burdens.
