Minister's Message



A beautiful tree in fall colours from my recent trip to Synod in Truro, Nova Scotia

Each fall, I take the time to attend the annual meeting of the Atlantic Synod of Presbyterian churches, which generally takes place at some fairly central location. This year, we were hosted by St. James in Truro, NS, from October 21st to 23rd.

One of my favourite parts of the fall Synod meeting are the trees. Visiting the mainland in October, I am reminded of how big their trees are compared to ours, how colourful, and how magnificent.

I admit to gawking a bit, and taking lots of pictures this year. It never ceases to amuse me how ambivalent the locals are to the beauty all around them. Sometimes, you have to have eyes to see the beauty right in front of you, I suppose, and there's nothing like the greys and browns of home to make me appreciate colours like these.

To be fair, all those oblivious local Presbyterians are always happy to be reminded of how lovely their province is, and having me point it out to them brightens their day too. Sometimes they even pause and admire the trees with me.

I believe that this attitude is tied to one of the key effects of our faith. We are called to look for beauty in the world around us, to see God's hand at work to bless us in our surroundings. Paul writes of all things working together for those who love God, Genesis tells us that when God made the world he called it Good, Revelation proclaims that the city of God will descend to us here as God's kingdom comes to earth as it is in heaven. As Christians, we love this world deeply. After all, God so loved the world that he gave his only Son!



We study the Bible because it teaches us how to be happy in this world. Through the stories of the Bible, we learn to look for the small glimmer of light and trust it to overcome the darkness. We know that suffering will come to us no matter how good we are, but we also learn that despite all we may see to the contrary, life triumphs over death. We are the ones who sing with joy in a graveyard, who prepare a great feast with five loaves and two fishes, who worship God at the foot of the cross, and who stand gawking at the beautiful trees God has made on an ordinary Tuesday in October.

This is how I learn to appreciate my life, my home, my family, and everything God gives me. I am learning to see the world through a lens of thanksgiving and joy, and find happiness welling up within me along with the energy to do good in the world.



Treasurer's Report

The regular Fall and Winter schedules for us and for our long-term renters is well underway. Our 2024 income to date is just shy of \$200,000, including all our donations, all our rental income and a borrowed amount of \$21,142.10 from our sinking fund. The sinking fund was created to hold monies donated for various groups, for specific expenses, and also contains a portion of the St. Aiden's Fund.

The outstanding amounts are due to various groups and companies. The largest share by far being the Presbyterian Church in Canada and its various entities. While we currently have \$10,695.48 in our current account, by November 1st I will have paid out \$11,330.60 to our employees, contractors, and local business entities. As you may see, I continue to pay what I can, when I can. The Board and Session are aware of these numbers and support me.

I am fully aware that in the last two months of the year we receive roughly 25% of our annual income. If you are able to support our church, please do so.

Thank you to all who are continuing to donate to your church through your envelopes on Sunday mornings, e-transfers, or through your monthly PAD contributions. My thanks go out to elders and friends who happily and gladly pick-up envelopes from those not able to get out and about.

Since childhood, Paul wanted to be a doctor. Through hard work and with the support of many who recognized his potential, he earned a BSc at MUN and an MD and MSc at McGill, and started his long medical career in Newfoundland in 1968. Family practice in the outports was his favourite, but he realized he could do more good by training doctors to do the work he loved, and so joined the MUN Faculty of Medicine. While there he filled many roles: commissioner on the Royal Commission on Hospital and Nursing Home costs; President of the Canadian College of Family Physicians; Head of the Family Practice Department of the MUN Medical Faculty; and the one he loved the most - family doctor for thousands of people. After his 'retirement' in 2002 he took on many locums in rural Newfoundland, and for many years wrote a column in the MUNMED newsletter which led to his book "Try to Help Love Grow". In 2023 the Canadian Medical Association awarded him a Honorary Life Membership.

All through his life, Paul took great joy in his family and put great effort in helping us make the best of the trials and opportunities we encountered. He enjoyed watching us all follow our different paths. He was always a great friend of God.

Condolences Dorothy "Dot" Thistle






