Minister's Message



This year, as St. David's celebrates its 250th anniversary as a worshipping community, I will be aiming to preach through the story of the Bible during our Sunday morning worship. There is too much to cover it all, I won't be reading every verse, nor every chapter. But my goal will be to provide an overall sense of the parts of the bible and how it works together to tell a single story. Just like a song is made up of many verses that repeat a melody but bring new meaning each time, many stories in the bible are made to echo earlier passages and provide nuance by the differences or similarities between them.

This past Sunday, we looked at the two creation stories in Genesis, and considered what it means that we have two separate stories of creation that don't seem to be written to fit together nicely. The state of the world before creation is described as a deep ocean in the first story, and as a parched desert in the second. These could not be more opposite images! But both are images we can understand, both are uninhabitable and hostile. Sometimes the image of land rising up can speak to us, and sometimes we will resonate more with water bubbling up. Both images will be used a lot in the rest of the Bible!

Minister's Message

On January 12, we will be continuing on in the story, looking at Genesis 3 and 4, the stories of the Fall when Eve and Adam ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, and the story of their sons Cain and Abel. I think many people secretly have a lot of questions about these stories, particularly the story of the Fall. Wasn't it kind of mean for God to trap Adam and Eve by putting a forbidden fruit within their reach? Wouldn't he know they were going to eat it? Didn't God lie when he told them they would die from eating it? If God's all about forgiveness, why doesn't he forgive them? These are all sensible questions to ask! Please join us on Sunday as we study these tricky but foundational stories.

The week after that, we will be taking a look at Noah's ark. This is often thought of as a children's story, but other than it being a story with animals in it, there is very little that is child-friendly here. All of creation is undone, and we return to the watery world of Genesis 1. How does this story set a pattern for stories to come? How long will the fresh start last? What sets this story apart from other flood narratives of the ancient near east? Come on the 19th to learn more!

Finally, on the 26th, we will look at one of the most important figures in the Old Testament, Abraham! Abraham is a key historical figure, and Christians, Jews, and Muslims all hold him in high esteem as something of a spiritual great-great-great-grandfather. So what kind of man was he, and how did he live up to the calling of being the father of God's chosen people? Not very well, as it turns out!

As we learn to see the human side of the Bible and of the people whose stories fill it, we learn to see God's love for humanity more clearly. Through the stories of Genesis, we learn to love the world around us more and more. These were the stories that the young Jesus would have learned in school, stories that inspired Him to be the kind of man He grew up to be, and so they are fully worthy of our time and thoughtful attention as we seek to be more like Him in our daily lives.

Come and join us as we celebrate our 250th anniversary this year, and learn from the story that has united our hearts for 250 years and beyond.

May God bless you richly in 2025 with plenty of everything you need, less of what you don't need, and the wisdom to tell the difference.





Moments in History

As we reflect back on our church history, we give thanks for the hard work of so many generations who came before us. One fruit of that hard work comes to us from the anniversary committee of St. David's fifty years ago, who wrote and collected a history of this congregation up until their time.

Originally shared as weekly bulletin inserts for the 200th anniversary, it was later collected into a written work available on our website (https://stdavids.nf.ca/who-we-are-2/our-history/) titled "The Dissenting Church of Christ at St. John's".

With thanks for their legacy, we share once more the history of our congregation in their weekly articles.

Treasurer's Report

As I reflect back on the past year, I can't help but feel positive. Yes, we had many ups and downs financially and there were times when we struggled to pay bills and meet our commitments. But, with your help and encouragement, we persevered - as we have done for 249 years! 2024 started off with a projected deficit over \$73,000.00. Early in the year, I used up whatever funds were available to me, including some money from the Memorial Fund and the St. Aidan's Fund. Some payments were put off entirely. In the first 11 months of the year we received \$211,585, a monthly average of \$19,235, but then December came along and we received \$52,886! As Treasurer, your generosity was a great gift. Many thanks!

I'd certainly like to acknowledge the support we have received this year from your donations to this church. These allow us to do everything from keeping the Church warm and cozy and the lights on to supporting our various groups and initiatives. You also support us in other ways: attending concerts, keeping our lawn and bushes looking beautiful, doing little "fix-up" jobs around the Church and the Hall; supporting our groups and organizations by attending meetings and events (such as Socktober and November's Winter Coat Drive); supporting Bridges to Hope on a weekly basis and of course helping with our own Christmas Hamper project.

I'd also like to give a special acknowledgement to the WA who keep the building looking lovely through their efforts (new flooring, kitchen supplies and equipment). They also organize and oversee a well attended monthly Bridge Party that contributes sizable funding to our coffers. Many thanks for all your work and enthusiasm!

Over Christmas, St. David's welcomed people we hadn't seen in a while, greeted family members visiting with loved ones and extended a warm welcome to people coming to our Church for the very first time. Our congregation is part of a bigger community. We come together to worship, to serve one another and to support our neighbours.

Treasurer's Report

As we embark on our 250th Anniversary, please reflect on what St. David's means to you and your family, now, and going forward into the future. Our future depends on you and everything you bring to our congregation. I hope that you continue to support St. David's in many ways and as best you can.







Glenn Barnes Recieves King Charles III Coronation Medal

In December 2024, Glenn Barnes was one of 30,000 Canadians who received the King Charles III Coronation Medal. Nominated by his daughter, Laura Barnes, the medal recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the country, province, and their communities. Over Glenn's multi decade career, he has contributed thousands of volunteer hours as an ordained elder for life for our congregation, Chair of Junior Achievement Newfoundland and Labrador, Chair of the Business Hall of Fame, Chair of Avalon Employment, Co-Chair and co-creator of the Rotary Firefighter of the Year awards, Chair of the Board of Regents for Memorial University, three time Paul Harris Fellow recipient, a recipient of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Award, and the True Rotarian award, treasurer of the Newfoundland and Labrador Liberal Party, and many more contributions to the country, province and community with his work in architecture and design. The medal will see 400,000 recipients throughout the commonwealth.

<u>Hampers - Saturday, December 21st - Thank-You!!</u>

One of the most rewarding activities we do as a congregation involves putting together and distributing close to 40 Christmas Hampers. We have many helpers from our congregation and the community - including a team of hockey players! Many thanks to Lillian Crawford and Anne Calver who start working on this project and lining up the volunteers early in the Fall. A big thank-you to everyone who: donated food and money; watched for the "specials" and then went shopping; carefully stored the items until packing day; put the boxes together; made numerous phone calls to our clients and our drivers getting everyone organized; picked up turkeys, vegetables sacks, eggs, etc.; carried the heavy totes of sugar and flour, etc. from storage to packing area; packed the boxes; and ensured that every driver had everything they needed for a successful delivery. Thanks to everyone for your time and generosity!







Meringue Squares

This is a flexible recipe that can be made with a variety of fillings. Start by separating two eggs. Beath the yolks slightly and set the egg whites aside for the topping.

Base:

½ cup butter or margarine

½ cup white sugar

Cream butter and sugar and then add the beaten egg yolks.

Mix 1½ cup of flower with 1 tsp of baking powder.

Combine with the butter, sugar and egg mixture. Add 1 tsp of vanilla.

Pat down in an 8" or 9" square pan. I usually use parchment paper in the pan since that makes getting the baked squares out of the pan easier.

Filling:

A variety of things can be used for the filling. I cooked some sliced Granny Smith apple slices in some water and sugar, along with a good handful of partridge berries. Alternatively, you could use canned pie filling or jam. If using jam, make sure that it is not too thick or else it will not spread over the base easily.

The original recipe called for dates: Chop 1 cup of dates and add to ½ cup boiling water. Cook until thick.

Topping:

Beat egg whites until stiff. Add 1 cup of brown sugar, a tablespoon at a time as you continue to beat.

Assembly:

Make sure that the base ingredients have been pressed into the pan evenly. Top with the filling of your choice. Spoon the meringue over the top, making sure that the edges have all been sealed.

Bake 30-35 minutes at 325 ° F.



2024 Programming Statistics

In 2024, overall visits to our food bank increased by 31% from 2023. Throughout the year, we heard from a number of families that they were at a breaking point, no longer able to keep up with the rapidly rising cost of housing, groceries, and other essentials. Out of the 17,191 visits to our food bank in 2024, 3.5% of households were accessing a food bank for the very first time.

The largest demographic increase we saw in 2024 was among children (0-18 years). Children made up 5643 visits to our food bank last year, up from 3450 in 2023. This marks a 63.5% increase. Given this increase, and thanks to the outstanding support of our donors in recent years, we were able to double the number of K-12 students we supported with our Bag to School program in 2024. This meant 725 local students went back to class with all the tools they needed to focus on learning, having fun, and being kids.

Nothing we do would be possible without the steadfast support of our community, who we have seen rally together again and again to ensure no one goes hungry. As we head into 2025, we must once again thank each and every one of our donors for their continued support of our mission. Our work is powered by your generosity; thank you for continuously answering the call.

Increased need for our services also reminds us that as we provide this critical and immediate food support, we must continue to advocate for policy solutions that address the root causes of food insecurity across our city, province, and country. This includes affordable housing, a stronger social safety net, and income measures that allow all members of our community to meet their needs, in turn reducing the need for food banks.

In 2025, we must continue to advocate for the most vulnerable in our community as we work toward a future where all of our neighbours have access to abundant, nutritious, and culturallyappropriate food.
