

Minister's Message





Do tigers have good camouflage?

I remember as a kid this question confused me. How was it that tigers, so well known for their bright orange and black striped fur, could be using it for camouflage in the green jungles they called home? I have since learned the secret, which is that the animals they hunt do not have eyes like mine. Most human eyes have three different types of colour sensors, and use a combination of all three to see in full colour. However, some humans, and most other mammals, lack one or more of these sensitivities. The most common lack, both in humans and other animals, is red-green colourblindness, and to eyes like that, a tiger's orange fur looks remarkably similar to the green leaves it hides among. If you know someone who is colourblind, ask them if they see a difference between the two pictures of the tiger above!

Is the God of the Old Testament loving and kind? I know many people who struggle with this question. Many of us have our own points of friction with certain stories, glaring problems to our eyes: Why did God even make a tree Adam and Eve weren't supposed to eat from? Why didn't God like Cain's gift as much as Abel's?

Minister's Message

When I was talking with my young son Oliver about the story of Noah and the Ark the other day, he asked why God didn't help all the other people outside of Noah's family be good instead of flooding the world, and I had to admit it was a good question! Just as I questioned the jungle camouflage of the orange tiger, God's goodness is sometimes hard to see in the stories of the Old Testament.

In the study of the bible, it is crucially important to learn to set aside our own preconceptions and basic cultural knowledge so that we can understand what the Bible is really trying to say in its own way. These writings come from a different world, written so long ago they may as well have been written for eyes fundamentally different from my own. What shocks me might have been normal to them, and what seems normal to me might shock them. This is what I am trying to do as we preach through the bible in our Sunday services, re-present the Bible in a way which invites you to engage with the narrative of scripture more on its own terms.

In the same way, in our daily lives, we must learn to empathize with the people around us. We are called to recognize that others don't see the world the way we do, and just as God lowered himself to our level to heal and feed and bless, we are called to be the sort of people who try to love people even when they are blind to reality, or at least, blind to some of it.

May we have the humility to value looking through the eyes of another, for it will help us understand the world.

May we recognize our own blindnesses, and try to love the efforts of those who want to teach us something we struggle to understand.

May we not think that because something doesn't make sense to us there is no wisdom or value in it at all.

May we read the Bible looking for the meaning underneath, not just reacting to it.

May we read the actions of our family, friends, and neighbours looking for the meaning underneath, not just reacting to them.


Eleanor Sends Greetings
