Minister's Message

Up until now, I have made it my general practice to avoid being too "political" in settings where I feel like I am wearing my minister's collar. I want St. David's to be a church where people who are truly diverse may find a home, because that is the image that the Bible points to, of all the nations streaming in to the city of God, with a garden in the centre. God's Kingdom unites us to each other in the end, as per the symbolic deeply symbolic "city" imagery of Revelations 21:23-26:



The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb is its lamp. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their splendor into it. On no day will its gates ever be shut, for there will be no night there. The glory and honor of the nations will be brought into it.



Humility is a key theme of the Bible, and in particular the history of God's people as recorded in the Old Testament, which we have been studying through this year so far. Repeatedly, God's people do not listen, fail to trust, sin, and show themselves to be not only no better than their neighbours, but often worse than them. God's people's main weakness is that they do not listen. In both Hebrew and English, the word "listen" also means "obey", and is a crucial concept in the Bible that God's people fail at over and over again.

I believe that understanding that the history we are called as Christians to claim in both the Old Testament and the New is fundamentally one which humbles us. We are not the best and brightest in all the world, but we are blessed nonetheless. We worship a God who teaches us to live without fear even when facing uncharted territory, not because of how smart or great or perfect we are in the world, but because we believe that it is better to trust in God.

Last night, I read an Executive Order from Donald Trump, the President of the self-proclaimed "Greatest nation on Earth", titled "RESTORING TRUTH AND SANITY TO AMERICAN HISTORY" and I feel that to proclaim the truth of what the Bible teaches means speaking up. The order begins:



"Over the past decade, Americans have witnessed a concerted and widespread effort to rewrite our Nation's history, replacing objective facts with a distorted narrative driven by ideology rather than truth. This revisionist movement seeks to undermine the remarkable achievements of the United States by casting its founding principles and historical milestones in a negative light. Under this historical revision, our Nation's unparalleled legacy of advancing liberty, individual rights, and human happiness is reconstructed as inherently racist, sexist, oppressive, or otherwise irredeemably flawed. Rather than fostering unity and a deeper understanding of our shared past, the widespread effort to rewrite history deepens societal divides and fosters a sense of national shame, disregarding the progress America has made and the ideals that continue to inspire millions around the globe."



With whatever authority is vested in me, I denounce this mindset, and I cling instead to the history of the Bible, warts and all. I refuse the narrative that silences the powerless and the oppressed in favour of unity in the story of the victor, because the story of God's people is the story of slaves and exiles.

When God's people suffer in the Bible, they suffer for their own sins. When they are blessed, the story isn't that they earned it by being amazing, our baptized family gives us no "unparalleled legacy" among God's People. Truly, the honour and the glory goes to God for the blessings, even though we often scratch our heads as to why God is blessing such sinners. To commit to this story, to bear this witness, is part of what I believe it means to follow Jesus Christ.

I make mistakes, even big ones. My church and my country make mistakes, even big ones like participating in residential schools, glorifying combat during the world wars, and participating in colonialism alongside our American neighbours. What makes us truly great is not our bravery, or our strength. It is not our own glory. It is our slow learning to care for the lost and the least, a growing concern for the impoverished and the abandoned, all children of the same God who saves me.

That is the history I will tell.

THE Dissenters Path

Thursday, April 24th 2:30 pm - 3:30 pm The Rooms Theatre

From the rugged barracks of 18th-century St. John's to the welcoming doors of St. David's Presbyterian Church today, the story of this congregation is one of resilience, faith, and community. Join us as we embark on a journey through time, following the Dissenters' Path through the streets of St. John's that traces the evolution of the congregation from its founding in 1775 to the present day.

This engaging presentation will feature insights from Dr. Steve Bruneau, PhD, P.Eng., along with members of the congregation's original founding families, who will share personal and historical perspectives on the congregation's rich legacy.

Using historical maps, archival records, and personal accounts, they will explore the key locations that shaped the congregation's history—from its earliest gatherings in the barracks of Fort William to the construction of the Stone Chapel, the devastating fires of 1892, and the eventual establishment of St. David's Presbyterian Church. Attendees will also have the rare opportunity to view archival records in person, including original documents and artifacts that bring the congregation's history to life.

Join us for a fascinating glimpse into the enduring spirit of St. David's, and the deep roots of religious dissent in Newfoundland and while seeing 250 years of history up close. After all, it's not everyday you turn 250 years old.



Treasurer's Report

St. David's finances are behaving as predicted last month. Meanwhile what does the treasurer do in the first quarter of the year? It's quite the list:

- Calculate the employee salaries (taxes, CPP, EI, any pension or insurances)
- Calculate the contractor rate(s) for the year
- Finalize the 2025 budget
- Get the files (Sage, banks, meeting minutes, etc.) ready for the auditor
- Help collate the income for the preparation of the receipts
- Find and correct any errors in documenting the church's income
- Find addresses for everyone who is to get a receipt
- Assist the Envelope Secretary with the receipts
- Prepare the T4's
- Complete any PIER review from CRA if they question the returns
- Prepare the treasurer's report of the church's Annual Report due out two weeks in advance of the Annual Congregational Meeting which will be held this year on April 27th 2025
- Help update the Board of Manager's list of things to do as a manager
- Get ready to complete the church's annual CRA report (T3010) to keep or status as a non-profit and a charity
- Complete (soon) the PCC new format which is used for their reporting in the annual Book of Forms
- Attend interesting webinars (PCC grants and process, stewardship, the new PCC version of the 3010, community usage of churches)
- Complete Canada Statistics reports on the property and its energy (oil and electrical) usages
- That came in handy when we needed to know the energy used for a new provincial "green" grant which is based on CO2 reduction from changing the use of oil to using electricity
- Grant preparation for available grants from the PCC

- Grant preparation for the new provincial grant, including discussions with possible provider(s) for any change in energy usage
- Monthly financial reports for the Session and the BOM and
- A monthly report for the News from the Pews
- The interesting movement of money back and forth from bank account to bank account, as necessary, so we don't bounce any checks
- Try to pay as many people, companies and entities on time and as our ability allows

That's the list of most of the activities. I've probably forgotten something or other and will find that out as soon as I press "Send"! As we embark on our 250th Anniversary, please reflect on what St. David's means to you and your family, now, and going forward into the future. Our future depends on you and everything you bring to our congregation. As treasurer, I do appreciate your generosity. I hope that you continue to support St. David's in many ways and as best you can.

Signs of Spring?

Many of us saw the first signs of Spring come to life in our gardens these past couple of weeks. Looks good!



Recipe of the month

Oatmeal-Raisin Bars

½ cup shortening (can use ⅓ cup of canola oil in a pinch)

¾ cup brown sugar

1 cup flour

1 cup rolled oats (not instant or quick cooking)

½ tsp salt

½ tsp baking powder

Good pinch of allspice or cinnamon

¾ cup milk

¾ cup chopped raisins, currants or cranberries. Partridge berries would not be a good choice.



I like to add ½ cup of applesauce, but reduce the milk to ½ cup.

Cream sugar and shortening. Mix dry ingredients and stir into sugar and shortening, alternately with the milk. Add fruit and mix well. Bake in prepared 8 or 9-inch square pan at 350 F. Test for doneness after 40 minutes. Do not overbake.

Ice with a butter icing.

If using dates, the following changes should be made.

Chop 1 cup of dates. This is about ½ package of Jaffa dates. Chopping the dates is necessary to make sure that no pits remain. Cover the dates with 1 tsp of soda and ¾ cup of boiling water. Mix well. Let cool completely, but do not drain!

Mix as above, but omit the milk. If the mixture appears to be too thick because the dates have absorbed much of the water, add up to ¼ cup of milk.

Bake as above.


